Are you short on vitamins? A simple test devised by Dr. John J. Boehrler of the University of Minnesota can give the answer quickly. "Barring actual disease of the gastro-intestinal tract in which all signs of Dr. Boehrler says, 'six simple questions will supply more information about a man's nutritional status than a complicated laboratory examination.' The questions: 1. How much milk do you drink? (If the answer is two or more glasses a day you can be pretty sure of an adequate intake of calcium and probably riboflavin, Boehrler said.) 2. How often do you eat meat? (One normal serving a day, Boehrler said, puts you beyond any danger of a protein deficiency and supplies the amino acids, the B factors, such as nicotinic acid, thiamin and riboflavin.) 3. How much cheese and how much meat do you eat? (If you eat cheese once or twice a week and five to seven eggs, he said, you are well supplied with protein, calcium and iron.) 4. What percentage of your flour and cereals is dark or enriched? (If the answer is 'practically all' you can be sure of a good supply of vitamin B fractions.) 5. How many fruits and vegetables do you eat? (The serving of fruit and four of vegetables daily make it certain you are getting enough vitamin C he said.) 6. How much butter do you eat? (Not less than six squares a day will do, Boehrler said, unless extra fat meat and eggs are taken to compensate.)
