synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

These are head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in any of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$10.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case a rough, scrubby or stony area. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. Removal of Ban Re Influenza Epidemic in Country Districts

In consequence of the Governor General having proclaimed Sunday next, the 17th instant, as a day of national Thanksgiving and prayer on the termination of the war, and in order that the people of this Province may have an opportunity of showing their gratitude by participating in same, the ban and restrictions of the Provincial Board of Health closing the Churches and other places of worship in this province during the present Influenza Epidemic is hereby removed, excepting in such localities as in the opinion of the Local Board of Health it is not yet advisable in the public interests to remove the same, the date of removal shall be fixed and acted upon by the Local Board of Health. The removal of such restrictions shall like-wise apply to the Public Schools in this Province excepting in cases as above mentioned. This Order does not apply to incorporated towns. KILLED IN ACTION

Mr. and Mrs. Hammond Bertram, of Hazel Grove have received the following touching letter of sympathy, the first intimation they received of the death in action of their son Sergeant Waldron Bertram, who made many friends while in the city with the 105th, Sergt Bertram who was killed on September 30th gave up his stripes to get to France but soon won them again on the battlefield and came through all the heavy fighting without a scratch until the above fatal day when he died at his gun. France October 6th, 1918

Dear Mrs. Bertram:

As you doubtless have been notified long before this reaches you of the death in action of your son Waldron, I thought perhaps you would appreciate a few lines from one who was with him at the time of his death, and ever since he enlisted. Waldron was killed on the morning of the 30th of September, and he died as he lived manfully doing his duty. We all feel keenly the loss of one of our most efficient N. C. O's and every man in the Battery extends his sincerest sympathy to you. In this your hour of trial. At the same time you may be proud of having such a son. I have known Waldron ever since he enlisted and his first thought was always for the comfort and welfare of his men. This war has cast a shadow over many a home in Canada and this last offensive has been a particular hard one on the boys from P. E. I. If at any time after this war is over and it is God's pleasure to spare me to see our dear home-land again I should be only too pleased to call on you and give you more particulars of where Waldron is buried and of his good work out here.
