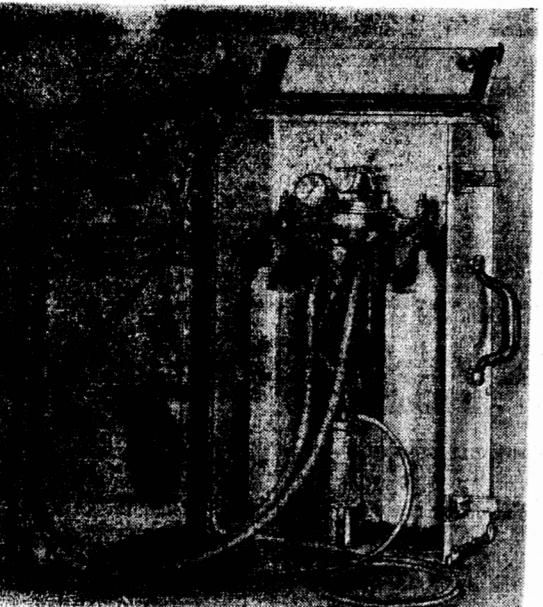

Souris Man Awarded The Military Cross

OTTAWA, June 21 - The Department of National Defense today announced 38 awards for gallantry in action overseas to members of the Canadian Army for distinguished service in the Italian theatre of war.

The list includes the name of Gunner Louis Joseph Meurant, 38, Royal Canadian Artillery, of Souris, P.E.I., who has been awarded the Military Cross.

Gnr. Meurant was born at Souris May 7, 1907.

His citation reads: "Gnr. Meurant is a lineman for a sound ranging troop of 1st Canadian Survey Regiment. This work necessitates him patrolling and maintaining telephone lines in the most forward areas. During the breaking of the Gothic Line and subsequent operations in the Po Valley these lines were constantly destroyed by heavy shelling and mortaring. In spite of these adverse conditions, Gnr. Meurant, showing initiative and steady courage, maintained the lines continuously. By his efforts the sound ranging troop was able to locate many hostile guns and report them to the counter battery office for counter action. On one occasion during a period of extremely heavy shelling and mortaring, Gnr. Meurant insisted on going out to re-plant a broken line and he and another linesman were wounded. Despite his wound he continued his work until he was successfully completed and then carried his companion to a first aid post. This soldier's courage and example have inspired his fellow linesmen to all ranks of his unit."

Nursing and National Health

No. IX - WHY ARE CLINICAL SUPERVISORS NEEDED?

The aim of nursing education is to prepare promising young women to give the best possible care to the public. The kind of nurse a student will become will depend upon her intelligence, adaptability, creative ability, and particularly upon the quality of teaching and supervision she receives during her period of training. It is readily appreciated, therefore, that there must be a supply of specially prepared graduate nurses, who can assume supervisory and teaching duties. They must be experts in the clinical branches they represent. These supervisors are also responsible for the care of the patients under their charge, and they must be well prepared to administer the nursing service.

It is fortunate that there is a growing interest and desire among nurses to prepare themselves as clinical specialists, that they may be better fitted to function as head nurses and supervisors on the hospital field.

Looking back to the beginning of the 20th century, one finds that there were practically no facilities for the preparation of graduate nurses for positions of leadership in nursing. Over the space of forty years great progress has been made. Universities have assumed responsibility for post graduate nursing courses of various types. Now university and hospital facilities are being combined to provide advanced clinical courses and in well maintained hospitals today there are qualified graduate nurses in charge of the several services. Post graduate preparation for head nurses and ward supervisors is one of the greatest factors in maintaining standards of good nursing care in hospitals.

Medical practice is becoming highly specialized, and the clinical nurse supervisor must keep pace with new knowledge relating to cure, prevention and health as applied to nursing practice in her specialty.

From the point of view of patients, how much more secure they must feel in knowing that the nurse in charge is well informed and experienced, and that the graduate staff and students are being directed by one who knows her job.

Every citizen expects adequate nursing care should he become a patient in a hospital. Perhaps this short treatment of "Why Are Clinical Supervisors Needed?" will gain stronger public opinion in support of nursing education for better nursing service.
