Scribner's, the Century and other leading magazines. His "Billards of Blue Water," Her Majesty the King, "Byways of War" have been widely read.

His prose works have included "The Life of John Boyle O'Reilly," "The Story of the Filibusters." The former, written in 10 weeks (the fall and early winter of 1890), amid the engrossing duties of editorial charge, shows nevertheless no trace of haste or high pressure. The result was an enduring literary memorial to his honored friend.

Mr. Roche's appointment to official service at Genoa he had felt came through the admiration which President Roosevelt had for John Boyle O'Reilly. Mr. Roche was consul at Genoa from 1904 to 1907, and was then appointed to the post at Bern in April 1907.

He was twice married. His first wife, who was Miss Halloran, died about 20 years ago. His second wife was the widow of Dr. Oakey of this city, survives him, as do a son, Arthur Somers Roche, and a daughter, Miss Florence Roche.

Miss Katherine E. Conway, who succeeded Mr. Roche as editor of the Boston Pilot, said last evening:

"I have known James Jeffrey Roche for many years. We were both assistant editors to John Boyle O'Reilly during the last six years of his life.

"When Mr. Roche became editor in charge of the Pilot in 1890, I became his associate and remained with him in that position until his departure for the consulate of Genoa to which he was appointed by President Roosevelt late in 1904.

"Few therefore, knew him better than I.

"Mr. Roche was a literary man rather than a journalist. The routine of the paper and demands on an editor as a public man, were exceedingly distasteful to him, though as an editorial paragraphist, he probably had no superior in the country. He was a slow and careful worker, and had a splendid prose style, the best example of which is to be found in his "The Story of the Filibusters," first brought out in London.

"His death in a strange land is singularly pathetic, and a shock to all those in Boston with whom he was long so closely associated."
