**Sentenced To Three Years In Penitentiary**

Christopher Keefe was sentenced to three years in Dorchester Penitentiary, New Brunswick, yesterday by Mr. Justice A. C. Saunders of the Supreme Court of Queen's County, Prince Edward Island. Charged with attempted rape, a jury found Keefe guilty but recommended clemency.
