Colorful Story Is Zane Grey's 'Lightning'

A picturization of the Zane Grey story "Lightning" was the feature picture shown here for the first time at the Capitol theatre yesterday. It is a fast-moving, highly dramatic picture of the lives of a couple of girls from the East, and a couple of boys from the open spaces of the West with a remarkable horse whose portrayal of a wild king of a herd of outlaws, was as clever a piece of equine acting as has been seen on the screen here in some time.

The battle waged by "Lightning" the name of the horse with another wild horse for supremacy of the herd was as thrilling a battle as could be witnessed at any time and had the audience in breathless wonder at the realism of the scene. Then again when this clever horse escaped a trap set for his capture and charged the man who was acut to lasso him, and eluded his lariat, unhorsing his tormentor and rolling him down a cliff, the applause was loud and long.

The story tells of the adventures of two cowboys, brothers who are determined to capture "Lightning" for the reward offered. At first they lose him and go to Chicago to sell the others they have captured. Here they meet two cabaret performers and fall in love with them, with their being jilted and relieved of some of their money, they return to the ranch disillusioned, while the girls who are on their way to cover an engagement via airplane are forced to a landing in the desert. At that time the brothers are trailing "Lightning" and come upon the girls. The recognition is mutual. How the girls capitulated and "Lightning" was brought into the fold of domesticity through his love for a beautiful mare "Bess" rounds out this highly interesting and entertaining film.

"Lightning", "Crimson Flash", third chapter, and a two part comedy are the feature attractions at The Capitol for the balance of the week.

quarrel. You are acting wisely in avoiding that method. Liberals as well as Conservatives want to travel in comfort and safety, and are equally anxious to save their necks from any after-night disaster in their efforts to navigate "hump-back" and "mud-pile" danger tracks. It is the case of a united people getting after that which they are entitled to, that is a reasonable common sense public service.

In justice let me say that since these public protests have been made, there are some improvements to acknowledge. A few of the roads have been put into better shape, and the "hump-back" models less vigorously adhered to. But the process is too slow, the whateops too tardily leveled, and this means of safe and comfortable travel for the tourists and people too slowly attended to.

TURNIP SEED

Sir,—In yesterday morning's "Guardian" Mr. Stanley Wedlock makes the statement that I have advised "all farmers" to sow "Bangholm" turnip seeds, as they are less liable to "Club Root" disease than other varieties.

This assertion is not correct. What I did say in The "Guardian" of May 26th, issue, was that "our Department has secured a quantity of "Bangholm" seed from the Experimental Farm at Nappan which we would advise any farmer whose land is polluted with germs of "Club Root" disease, and who may doubt the resistant characteristics of this variety, to at least plant a small quantity of and experiment with other varieties, and learn for himself whether or not it will prove immune."

If Mr. Wedlock finds it necessary to announce the fact that he is one of the largest—if not the largest—turnip shipper in the Province, he should adopt the means used by his competitors, at the regular advertising rates, who do not all agree with his opinion respecting the table quality of "Bangholm" turnip, rather than by mis-representing the advice from the Agricultural Department, to farmers whose land is so polluted with germs of "Club Root" disease, that they find it impossible to grow a profitable crop from seed of the standard Swede varieties, an infinitesimal percentage of whom are situated to take advantage of the export turnip market.
