TORONTO, Aug. 1.—Rev. Dr. Geo. Young, an early pioneer Methodist preacher, died at his home in Toronto today, aged eighty-nine years.

PUBLIC DRINKING CUPS BARRED IN MASSACHUSETTS.

BOSTON, Aug. 1.—The common drinking cup will be absent from public drinking fountains by order of the state board of health after October 1, in accordance with the act of the last legislature to prevent the spread of disease. The cups are forbidden also in public buildings, hotels, theatres, railroad cars, stations or ferry boats. Every one found will cost its owner \$25 fine.

SAN SEBASTIANE, August 1.—King Alfonso and Queen Victoria left today to pay a visit to the royal family in England. They will stop at Rambouillet, France, to visit President Fallieres.

ENGLISH R. R. ACCIDENTS.

LONDON, Aug. 1.—The Board of Trade report on railway accidents in the United Kingdom shows that in 11264,800 passenger journeys only one passenger lost his life in an accident on the train in which he was travelling, the first case for a period of twenty months, while the number of injured, 390, is low compared with the average of previous years.

A COSTLY ANNEX TO WINDSOR STATION.

BIG CONTRACT LET. WINNIPEG, Aug. 2.—The contract for the substructure of a big \$1,000,000 high level bridge over the Saskatchewan, connecting Edmonton and Strathcona, has been let by contract to John Gunn & Sons, of Winnipeg. The C. P. R. has charge of the building of the bridge and street carry general traffic trains and street cars. A considerable part of the cost is being defrayed by grants from both cities and from the Dominion government.
