Gandhi Departs

LONDON, Dec. 5.—(A.P.)—Mahatma Gandhi packed his lincolns and spinning-wheels last night and prepared to take the homeward trail to India with disappointment in his heart.

Convinced that the second Round Table Conference failed to grand India her demands and undecided as to whether to renew his civic disobedience campaign against Great Britain, he leaves today to take council with the leaders of the Indian Nationalist Congress.

He will depart for Folkestone about 9 a. m. and there take a channel boat for France, intending to spend a short while in Paris. He will go on to Geneva for three or four days and will address an assembly of pacifists. He will sail from Brindisi, Italy, at the end of next week and will arrive in Bombay about December 28.

He planted a tree today in front of east side Kingsley Hall, where he has stayed in a tiny cubicle for the past several months. As he shoveled the earth over the seeds and the crowd sang "Auld Lang Syne," he remarked: "I hope the friendships I have made in England will grow as this tree."

KING'S SON-IN-LAW IS BEATEN IN LAWSUIT

LONDON, Dec. 5.—Damages of \$80,000 and costs were awarded today to Charles Chapman, a racehorse trainer, in a libel suit against the Jockey Club and others, including Lord Harwood, husband of Princess Mary.

Chapman contended his career was ruined by a Jockey Club statement which, he said, made it appear he had "doped" the horse, Don Pat. Besides the Jockey Club and Lord Harwood the defendants were the Earl of Ellesmere, the Earl of Rosebery and Weatherbys, printers of the famous racing calendar of which the Jockey Club is proprietor, and the London Times.

Commission On German Finances

(By Melvin K. Whiteleather (Associated Press) BASEL, Switzerland, Dec. 5.—Germany will begin another battle today to convince the world that she can no longer pay great war reparations.

The German members of the Young plan advisory committee which is to begin an examination of Germany's financial situation on Monday, are due today, laden with documents supporting their contention that the former allies should not ask for more war damages.

It was said that Dr. Theodor Melchior, head of the German delegation, is bringing a monumental collection of papers and statistics which may necessitate an adjournment for two or three days while the committee studies them.

The French and Belgians also are due today and it is expected that informal exchanges of views will start almost immediately. The British, United States, Japanese and Italian representatives are expected on Sunday.

TRINITY UNITED CHURCH

There were good congregations at both services yesterday and in the Sunday School the roll showed 421 present. Rev. Dr. Ramsay was the preacher in the morning and spoke from the text John 3-11. "We speak that we do know and testify that we have seen." It was a profound discourse on the question as to where we should look for authority in matters religious and spiritual. Dr. Ramsay stressed the authority of experience. The Christian religion emphasizes the value of a personality. There is an instinct in the human heart that craves to venture and gives us faith. The experience of God in our soul. The great scientist G. J. Romanes, said "I know as the experience within is as important as the experience without." As we venture forth we can carry with us the words of the Master, "Lo, I am with you always."

In the evening Rev. Mr. Brown spoke from the text Acts 3-6. "Then Peter said, silver and gold have I none but such as I have give I thee, in the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth rise up and walk." Here is Christianity in action, Christ at work. Has the Church of Christ still her ancient power? Mr. Brown answered this in the affirmative and dealt with the necessity of "a positive life." No one will be held accountable for the talents which they have not, but Mr. Brown made a stirring appeal for the use of the talents we have. Peter did not claim any merit in himself, his declaration was "In his name and through his name was this man healed." The call is for "Christians at work."

The praise for the day included two splendid selections from the new hymnary, Miss Margaret Sterns singing the solo part very sweetly in the morning and Mrs. S. J. Burns of Boston gave two delightful solos in the evening, "There is a green Hill" by Gounod, and "One sweetly solemn thought" by Marston.

IN MEMORIAM

MAJOR J. A. MACDONALD

Militiamen not only in this province but throughout the Dominion will learn with regret of the passing in the City Hospital on Wednesday last of Major J. A. MacDonald, for many years attached to the heavy artillery of Quebec. Major MacDonald who was born at Springfield, Lot 65, fifty eight years ago, was a son of Mrs. Catherine and the late Angus McDonald. He received his early education in the district school and while in his youth showed a great interest in military affairs. So interested in the work he joined a company of the engineers here and shortly after he became attached to the heavy artillery.

At the time of the South African War he proceeded to the scene and served there for fourteen months. When hostilities were concluded he returned to Quebec and after spending a short time there proceeded to England where he took a special course in artillery work at the successful completion of which he returned to Quebec.

In 1912 he was transferred to British Columbia, subsequently serving in Halifax and Sydney, his last transfer being to Kingston where he was stationed when he retired on pension, something over three years ago, and has since resided in Charlottetown.

Major MacDonald who arose from the ranks of gunner to his present position gained his promotion by sheer merit. He was a popular officer and a familiar figure to all militiamen who attended the yearly camp at Petawawa.

His furlough, generally at the Christmas season, was invariably spent at his home here, with his mother, Mrs. Catherine McDonald who survives.

He also leaves to mourn two sisters, Miss Mary, of this city, Mrs. Wm. Connick, Bedford, and one brother Wilbur, of the Post Office Department, Ottawa. To the bereaved the Guardian tenders sincere sympathy.

The funeral was held Saturday morning to St. Dunstan's Basilica where Requiem High Mass was celebrated. Interment was in the R. C. Cemetery.

BOY SCOUT PATROL LEADERS CONFERENCE

The Annual Patrol Leaders' Conference for P. E. I. was held in St. James Church Hall Saturday afternoon and evening. Twenty-four boy leaders from the six Charlottetown Troops attended, out-of-town scouts being unable to be present owing to inclement weather.

This conference was held under the leadership of Asst. Provincial Commissioner Wm. Warren, Provincial Secretary R. C. Parent, and Scoutmaster C. Walker.

The meeting was conducted under the patrol system, that is, the boys were divided into three patrol-scouts, Maitland Owen, Cal Vinnicombe and Ivan Walsh acting as leaders.

The Conference took the form of discussion on a number of topics, relating particularly to the duties of patrol leaders, interspersed by games and songs, conducted by the patrol leaders. The following topics were discussed: Patrol Discipline, Building a Patrol Program, The Patrol Corner, The Court of Honour, The Patrol Leader's Job, Patrol Spirit, Proficiency Badges, Camp for 1932, Jamboree.

Regarding the next Jamboree which is to be held in Austria, Hungary, in 1933, the scouts voted that in case P. E. I. was represented no boy should be sent who was not a First Class Scout and who had not attended at least one Scout Camp. This means that a boy to be eligible must be a Second Class Scout previous to January 1st, 1932, as a First Class Scout must serve as a second class scout for one year.

An interesting feature of the afternoon session was the investiture of Charles Batt to the Brotherhood of Scouts. This scout promise was made to his Scoutmaster, Mr. Wm. Warren, in the presence of the other scouts.

At six o'clock the boys and a number of guests sat down to a sumptuous supper prepared by a ladies' committee from seven city churches, with Miss Margaret Irving as Conventor.

anese army when circumstances make it advisable. of the League of Nations Council decided last night to ask the Tokyo representatives of Great Britain, the United States and France to assist in clearing up the Japanese attitude toward this proposal.

No new instructions from either Nanking or Tokyo were presented, although they have been awaited for some time.

So far as could be learned from those in a position to know, Japan still insists that it cannot recognize the authority of any third party in the neutral zone, and demands that the Japanese military get out of Manchuria. It is reported that the Japanese require that the neutral zone be policed by Chinese civilians subject to intervention by the Japanese.

Meanwhile news received here that the Japanese were reporting menacing activities by the Chinese armies conflicted with reports to the council from neutral observers who said the Chinese army was entirely inactive and making no preparations even for defense.

Joins Largest Shipping Combine In The World

(Canadian Press) WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 5.—A powerful east and west coast shipping combine has assumed control of the United States lines.

Hurdling the last technicality, the Roosevelt-Dawson Dollar interests contracted with the shipping board to operate the North Atlantic Line, including the Steamship Leviathan and other giants yet to be put into service.

As the ships reach port they will be redocumented in the name of the United States Lines Company, creation of the largest shipping combine in the world. The company will operate 181 passenger and freight boats with a tonnage of 1,192,227. The investment value is \$110,000,000.

Today the Manhattan, its 30,000 tons representing the largest passenger vessel ever built in this country, will be launched at Camden, N. J., and go into service of the new company.

Brazil-Canada Trade Agreement Signed

See Menace In Advancing Troops

(By Glenn Babb, Associated Press Staff Correspondent) MUKDEN, Manchuria, Dec. 5.—Japanese communiques again are drawing a picture of a Chinese military menace to Mukden similar to that sketched just before last week's thrust which was halted half way to Chinchow.

A headquarters spokesman who for the past three days had reported several instances of Chinese reinforcements around Chinchow and movements in the direction of Mukden, exhibited a map based on observations by aviators showing the disposition of what he said were 35,000 to 40,000 Chinese regulars.

The lines extended in a long quarter moon from Chinchow through Tuhushan along the Tuhushan-Gungliao railway, including Fakumen, fifty miles northwest of Mukden, thus tending to envelop Mukden.

He said a great part of these forces had been brought north of the great wall recently, and that Chang Tso-Hsiang, the former Kirwin War Lord, had reached Chinchow on Nov. 29, becoming the ranking Chinese commander. He said these alleged reinforcements did not yet constitute a menace requiring the Japanese army to take positive measures.
