IN THIS CORNER

Looking to be in the pink of condition for a knockout Halifax arrived in the city yesterday evening primed for his ten-round date tonight when he meets Stan Biggar, Island heavyweight champion in the main event of the boxing card being staged at the Forum. Confident of winning Smith is a likely looking fighter with his 200 pounds well distributed over his rangy body.

Rated as a very heavy puncher, Smith's style of battle tonight will be to go out in the very first round looking for a knockout. Hearing that Biggar himself was a mixer the Halifaxian was more than pleased and it is a sure bet that tonight's fans will witness a bruising, hard-hitting struggle once the pair answer the first bell.

Comparing their measurements one can notice very little difference between the pair. Biggar has an advantage in age, weight and reach but the differences are very small and the pair will enter the ring very evenly matched. Scheduled for ten rounds it is problematical just how far the fight will go. Two fighters with hitting ability like Biggar and Smith possess usually end their fights early and when both like to slug it out then a guess on almost any round would not be out of order.

It is likely that the two will enter the ring at even odds. There is a slight inclination towards picking Smith before fight time but Biggar's many followers will likely quickly cover any Smith money that is in sight.

Biggar wound up his training yesterday with a light workout and as he breezed through his final session he was more confident than ever of being returned the victor. Coming in at 204 pounds he will have a 3-pound pull in the weights over his opponent and although this advantage is very slight nevertheless it may or may not mean a whole lot before the fight is over.

McKernan and McCormack, who meet in the semi-final which is also scheduled for ten rounds, also are ready for the going. And here is a fight that has a lot of possibilities. Both boys are clever with their fists, both can hit plenty hard when the right opportunity presents itself and the consensus of opinion is that the fans will see a lot of fighting before the end of what has been billed as the semi-final but which might turn out to be the best scrap on the card.

With a well-matched preliminary preceding the card these should be a large attendance tonight. It holds plenty of promise; all the fighters have trained hard for their bouts and the promoter promises there will be a full moment upon the lights are dimmed and the first punches are called to the center of the ring.

Everything appeared so smooth that Promoter Mike was just a bit worried. "Everything's going too good," he said. "We've already got \$250,000 cash in the box and it looks like the show can't miss doing a million bucks, only..."

If Mike, a kind of promoter who gets more kick getting out of jams than he does in picking up a stray dollar, thinks he's going to escape a few headaches in this venture he may be surprised. The anti-Nazi group in New York is sure to make at least a dozen noisy demonstrations against Schmeling.

Schmeling Boosed Last night, when announcement was made of the fight at ringside before Henry Armstrong's massacre of game little Barney Ross, the crowd drowned out Schmeling's name with violent boos, whereas Louis' name was cheered quite as furiously. A movement already is afoot to pocket the big brawl at Yankee Stadium but it won't mean a thing, evidently, because advance ticket sales are brisker than anticipated. Reservations have been made by fight fans from a score of nations the world over, from Australia to France. A record assemblage of 700 newspapermen is expected. More than 1,000 Germans are coming over on a chartered tour to witness the fight.

At their rival camps—Schmeling at Speculator, N. Y., and Louis at Pompton Lakes, N. J.—champion and challenger already are in serious training while Jacobs' press agents grind out reams of copy to ballyhoo the show.

Bois Roussel, French Bred Colt, Provides Upset In Winning The Epsom Derby

EPSON, England, June 1.—(CP)—A triumph for the French strain of thoroughbred was achieved today when Bois Roussel, a colt by Vautout out of Plucky Leger and purchased only a few weeks ago by Hon. Peter Beatty, won the Epsom Derby from a field of the best of England's three-year-olds. Surefooted over the ups and downs and round the bends of the rain-soddened course, the French colt had the speed and the stamina to make up ground lost at the start and finish fou, lengths ahead of James V. Rankin's Scottish Union and six lengths in front of the 9 to 4 favorite, H. E. Morris' Pasha.

The race added another chapter to the long rivalry between French and English bred horses, but the colt's owner is a son of the late hero of Jutland, Admiral of the Fleet Earl Beatty. When Mr. Beatty went to the royal box for congratulations there were many a cry of "Well done Peter!"

Giants Lose To Pirates, Lead Cut To Two Games; Tigers Defeat Yanks 8-4

NEW YORK, June 1.—(AP)—New York Giants still deep in the hitting slump, dropped a 4-1 decision to young Russ Bauers, and the Pirates at Pittsburgh today, and had their National League Baseball lead cut to two games as a result.

Bauers, going the route for the first time this year and scoring his first victory, knocked Bill Terry's troupe with five hits, all in the first six innings. After being blanked twice in Boston Monday, the Giants stretched their scoreless streak to 22 innings before showing their lone run across in the sixth on Jim Ripple's double.

At St. Louis the sixth place Cardinals resembled the powerhouse of former seasons as they slugged out a 9-4 victory over the cellar dwelling Philadelphia Phils. One of Joe Medwick's four hits was his fifth home run of the season.

Johnny Vander Meer pitched a five hitter for his fourth win of the year, and the Reds won, all in the lynx's doddering Dodgers 4-1 in the opener of a three-game National League Baseball series at Cincinnati.

American League NEW YORK, June 1.—(AP)—Venon Kennedy came within three home runs of shutting out the Yankees today as he pitched De-

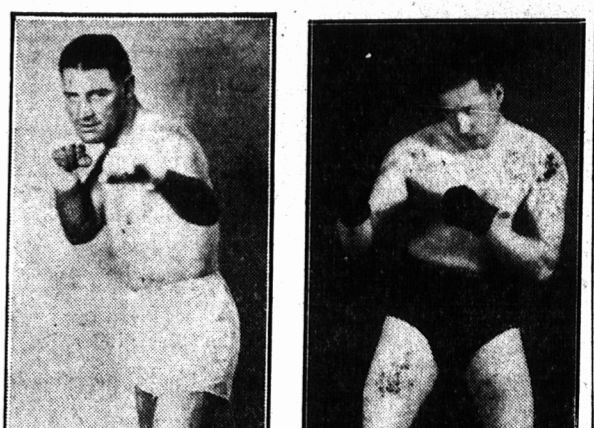
