CHARLOTTETOWN TO BE REPRESENTED.—Mayor Brown and Councillor Wright of Charlottetown, will be among the speakers at the annual meeting of the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities to be held at Truro, August 29, 30 and 31st. The subject they will discuss is Maritime Union. Among the other speakers will be Mr. Thomas Adams, of the Conservation Commission of Canada. Mr. Adams visited Charlottetown last year and spoke at a meeting of the Development Commission.

A HANDSOME VESSEL.—One of the finest sailing vessels to visit Charlottetown for some time is the tern schooner Marion J. Smith, which arrived in port yesterday morning from Barbadoes with a cargo of 850 puncheons of molasses for Carvell Bros. This vessel is just a year old and was built at Liverpool, N. S. She is owned by W. C. Smith & Co., and is commanded by Capt. Geldart. The vessel is built on handsome lines and is spotlessly clean and fitted up in the most up-to-date manner. After discharging her cargo here she will proceed to St. John's Nfld., to load fish for the Brazils.
