NEW YORK, Nov. 1—(AP)—A famous American bred four-year-old colt was destroyed today. Cortado, who won the 1938-39 season, was killed in a fall on Oct. 12 in the Gallant Fox Handicap at Jamaica.

The colt was insured for \$40,000 by Lloyd's of London. He had run 11 previous races in this country, winning twice and earning \$20,000. He recently set an American record of 2:28 2-5 for 1-1/2 miles.

Predicts Rookies In Red Wings Line Christmas

CHICAGO, Nov. 1—(CP)—The National Hockey League, its seven teams self-admittedly strengthening for a long trek to the playoffs opens the 1939-40 season tomorrow night with the revamped Detroit Red Wings playing the Black Hawks at Chicago.

But it will be another week before all teams have seen action and almost two weeks before the six cities in which the teams perform get their first taste of big-league play. Boston fans must wait until Nov. 14 when the Black Hawks tangle with the Bruins.

If there is such a thing as a pre-season favorite in hockey the Bruins have been made a slight choice to retain the Stanley Cup they won last season after a stirring series with New York Rangers and Toronto Maple Leafs. But all too often the Stanley Cup holder has been a doormat the following season and no one is going exactly overboard for Boston.

The Bruins will swing into action for the first time at Toronto Saturday night, followed by Chicago's meeting with Canadiens in Montreal and the Rangers' with the Red Wings in Detroit Sunday. New York Americans last to fall in line, open against Canadiens in Montreal a week tomorrow.

The first New York game will be played at the Leafs' rink on Sunday, Nov. 12. From there in to the final league game March 17 there are the usual four playing nights.

Indicative of the changes made since 1938-39 season closed, the Black Hawks will have five players in new uniforms—Dix Smith, Doug Bentley, George Allen, Phil Hergeheimer and Les Cunningham—while the Red Wings, who finished a notch above the last-place Hawks last season, will have no fewer than six starting their first full season as Wings.

Winnipeg's Billy Marquart Scores Sensational K. O. Over Bill Beahuld

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, NEW YORK, Nov. 1—(CP)—Billy Marquart, young Canadian whose smile belies the murder in his mitts, scored a sensational knockout over Bill Beahuld of Jersey City here tonight to start up the hill to fistic fame and fortune while old Tony Canzoneri suffered a quick defeat in another bout to be had down the other side into oblivion.

Maryland - bred Colt Goes Out Front To Win Race For Year's Championship

Associated Press Sports Writer BALTIMORE, Nov. 1—(AP)—Chalcedon came home today to win the racing championship of the year.

With a great stretch drive that was all heart, William L. Brann's Maryland-bred colt got up to take the Pimlico Special by half a length from Charles S. Howard's Kayak II. Townsend B. Martin's Cravat was a distanced third.

Chalcedon took the \$10,000 purse in this mile and three sixteenths "dream race," a gold cup and earned ranking as the horse-of-the-year.

Most of the 22,000 fans who turned out of the gallop which young Alfred G. Vanderbilt conceived and brought to reality were strong for the local horse. As a result the bay son of Challenor II-Laura Gal, winner of the Preakness last May on this same track, was backed down to \$2.90 for \$2 in the mutuels.

Only once was there any question about his coming home ahead. That occurred as the three-horse field rounded into the stretch turn and Kayak, ridden by George Woolf of Cardston, Alta., made his bid, after chasing Chalcedon all the way up to that point. As they headed for home, Kayak poked himself in front. And it was right there that Chalcedon showed his heart.

Jockey Eddie Arcaro went to the whip. Chalcedon drew even half-way down the stretch, then slowly but surely shoved his nose in front. After that, he traveled the final few yards to the wire without cooling around.

He finished the route in 1:59, fair time for a track, when white in good condition, was not yet completely dried out from three days of rain.

The purse in this winner-take-all affair boosted Chalcedon's earnings for the year to \$184,535 and marked his ninth victory in 15 starts in 1939.

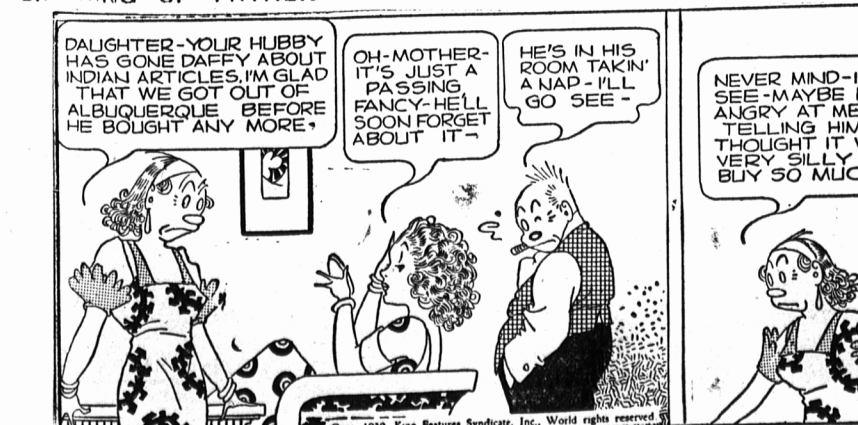

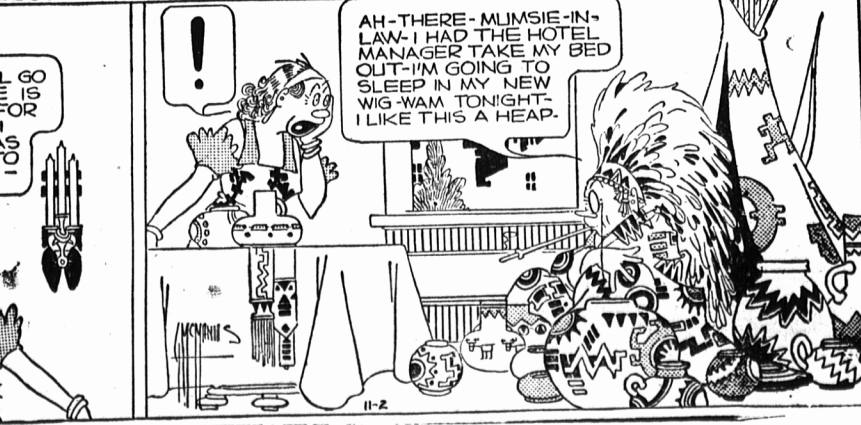
