THE weather of yesterday brought to the minds of the citizens visions of the cold fall days in October and November. The rain continued at intervals through the evening and made the arrival of tourists by trains and boats very unpleasant.

AN Ottawa despatch says it is understood that Hon. H. R. Emmerson has been asked to take a cabinet position, probably the portfolio of Marine and Fisheries. His recent trip was taken on the suggestion of the Government, who wanted the New Brunswick situation sized up.

THE Engineers were inspected last night at Victoria Park by the D. O. C. Colonel Moore. The movements included the march past, manual exercises and company movements and the work down re-pected great credit on the officers of this efficient corps. The 4th Regiment Band were also in attendance at the inspection.

B., Sept. 17-20, beginning at 7.45 Thursday evening, Sept. 17th, and closing on Sunday night Sept. 20th. PONTIFICAL High Mass of Requiem for the repose of the soul of the late Pope was celebrated in St. Dunstan's Cathedral yesterday morning at nine o'clock. His Lordship the Bishop was celebrant, assisted by Rev. J. T. Roche as high priest, Revs. J. P. McGrath and Dr. McLellan, deacons of honor; Revs. Dr. Curran and F. Cacciola, deacons of office; and Rev. Dr. Morrison, master of ceremonies. An eloquent sermon eulogistic of the late Pontiff was preached by Rev. Dr. Morrison and excellent music was furnished by the choir under the direction of Prof. Blanchard.

ON Sunday morning at St. Joachim's Church, Vernon River, Rev. Kenneth McPherson, Ugg who was ordained to the priesthood on Saturday, sang his first high mass. The church was thronged with people of all creeds as "Kenneth" as he was familiarly called, was a general favorite with all denominations. Rev. Drs Doyle and Monaghan acted as deacon and sub-deacon. An appropriate and well delivered sermon was given by Rev. Dr. Monaghan, who fully sustained his reputation as an eloquent preacher. After receiving the newly ordained priest's blessing the congregation dispersed with pleasant recollections of the solemn service.

ABOUT one o'clock on Saturday afternoon July 11, the death occurred at Regina Hosital of Arthur Craswell, brother of J. W. Craswell. He died in his 23rd year and up to two weeks previous to his death was in the best of health. The immediate cause of his death was a hemorrhage which was quite unexpected. He had been employed since coming to Regina at the Glasgow House. The funeral was held on Monday from Knox Church to Regina cemetery, the services being conducted by Rev. W. P. Adam of Lunenburg. Arthur Craswell was a native of Prince Edward Island and the remains were home in sorrow to the grave by six young companions from the same little Isle, the pallbearers being Messrs Oaseley, McAuley, Rouble, Taylor, Lord, and Ferguson. A beautiful wreath from the members of the firm and employees of the Glasgow House testified to the high regard felt for the deceased by those with whom he came in daily contact. Much sympathy is felt for his bereaved brother and family. The deceased leaves his father and brother in Summerside to mourn.
