MAN ON THE EARTH 500,000 YEARS AGO

Dr. J. Leon Williams, an eminent authority on anthropology and geology, arrived in New York Friday from Liverpool with fifteen skulls of his prehistoric man, one of which he estimated to be 500,000 years old. This skull was found by workmen near Folkstone, England, in strata that dated back prior to the pleistocene era and its existence and discovery have confirmed Dr. Williams in the belief that mankind is at least a half million years old.

Dr. Williams said the finding of these ancient skulls and other human ones did not disprove, in his opinion, the Darwinian theory, but altered it in some degree. Instead of man being a descendant of the ape, Dr. Williams said that the skull tend to confirm the belief that the anthropoid ape was an offshoot of primitive man. One of the chief distinction between these skulls and those of apes, he said, was to be found in the teeth.

DEAD SON HALTS HIS SUPPOSED FUNERAL

HAMILTON, Ont., Nov. 20—When John Thompson walked into his home at 3422 North John street, last evening, he was surprised to find the members of his family gathered about a casket which was supposed to contain his body. For a time there was consternation in the household, but the members soon recovered from the shock and celebrated his return as though the dead had actually come to life.

The body which really lay in the home had been identified by Thompson's father, who believed his son had been on board the steamer James Carruthers when it sank last week. But his son had not been on the Carruthers, and while in Toronto had read of his supposed death, and hurried here to reassure the family. The other body was sent to an undertaking room, and will be sent back to Goderich for identification.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC YIELDS.

HOUSTON, Texas, Nov. 20—The strike of operating employees of the Southern Pacific lines in Texas and Louisiana was ended today when the railroad yielded to the demands of the men to meet a federated committee of the four unions in the contract. The men were ordered to resume work immediately. Within thirty minutes after the announcement was made that the strike had been ended idle wheels began to turn in the Houston railroad yards. The railroad had not attempted to move any freight since operating employees in Louisiana and Texas went on strike last Thursday night.
