There are also left to mourn four sons, William in Calgary, Robert, Charles and Thomas of Wilnot also six daughters, Mrs. A. S. McKay, Mrs. Wesley Wood, Mrs. Geo. Robertson, Summerside, Mrs. Frank Tuplin, New Annan, Mrs. Charles McFarlane, Pine Wood and Mrs. Smallman, Boston. Three Brothers, William and Alex of Summerside, and John of Wilnot and one sister, Mrs. Cousins, Summerside, also survives him.

—A very interesting horse-race took place on Grand River ice on Wednesday afternoon last at which there was some interesting sport. There were two races, a three minute class and a green race, the former was won in straight heats by Decoder, owned by James Winchester, Lot 14, with Roguish Jim, owned by John Campbell, Wellington, second and Coll Wilks, owned by P. McLellan Lot 14, third. The green race was the most interesting of the day each heat being closely contested between Bob J. owned by A. E. McLean Lot 16, and Lady Brazilian owned by A. T. McLellan, Lot 14. The race was won by Bob J. who captured the last two heats, Lady Brazilian taking the first, Dolly Wilks owned by Artemus McArthur, Lot 13, being third.

—A well attended meeting of the Dunk River Institute was held in the school house at Lower Bedeque on Monday evening the 22nd, inst. Joseph Taylor the President of the Institute presided. After the usual routine business had been transacted a letter from the Department of Agriculture, re the passing of Legislation for the eradication of noxious weeds. All present were of the opinion that something should be done in that direction, but how far the legislation should go towards compelling the farmers to destroy noxious weeds growing on their farms was debated at some length. The following resolution was unanimously carried. Resolved—That this meeting of the Dunk River Farmers Institute approves of the movement on the part of the Department of Agriculture looking towards the eradication of noxious weeds, and the favoring the passing of legislation providing for the destruction of weeds from the public highways, and giving encouragement to farm owners to clean their farms from weeds. The Secretary then read a paper on "The advisability of encouraging cream separators." As the paper will be published it is not necessary to give any of the arguments employed showing that the general use of hand separators would injure the dairy industry. An animated discussion followed the reading of the paper, taken part in by Joseph Taylor, Howard McFarlane, Horace Wright, James Carruthers, Norman Montgomery, Alexander Henderson, and others. It was agreed to further discuss this important subject at the next meeting to be held at Centerville, March 13th.
