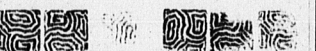

It cannot be denied that the present season has been an excellent one for the farms and gardens, the products of which have attained a success far surpassing that of other years. In the flower garden perhaps the most interesting result of the favorable season is the fact that hardy roses are beginning to bloom for the second time this season.

The Guardian has been presented with a full-blown, double crimson rose plucked yesterday from a bush growing in the garden of Mrs. Diamond Easton Street. There are a number of other buds on the bush. The Guardian has also been shown some superb specimens of cactus and pompon dahlias grown by Louis Hazzard. The cacti flowers are apparently far more beautiful than any specimens shown in former years.

The signal system for the protection of the public on Hillsborough Bridge has now been completed and works most satisfactorily. If a train is crossing the bridge the gates are opened and the main switch is also open and the signals outside are set danger to prevent train going on bridge. If however the train runs past the outside signals it would be checked at the switch. When a train is crossing the gates are put down to keep teams out before the train enters, and closing the switch automatically brings the signals to clear. When the train passes off the gates are raised, the switch automatically opened, and the signals set at danger so that there is no possibility of the train going on the bridge while it is being used by teams. The inside signals at the centre of the bridge are controlled by the man on the swing span. When he wants to turn the span he pulls the releasing bolts. This sets all signals at danger. In the event of the train entering the bridge when the signals are set for the open span the train automatically disconnects the spark circuit of the gasoline engine which operates the span so that it is impossible to use the draw when the train is on the bridge. There are three men on the bridge one at each end and one at the swing whose duty it is to look after it and see that the signals are kept in good working order. A telephone system connects them with each other and with the dispatchers office at the railway.
