South Australia

314,000 POUNDS FOR WOOL

South Australian primary producers this month had some of their best news for years. Most important, perhaps, because it represented actual receipts, was the success of Adelaide's September wool sales, which saw some of the best wool catalogued in this State of recent years offered to a big attendance of buyers who competed for it eagerly. Particularly did that apply to the Continental section, for the well-grown fleeces of fine quality offered them exactly what they sought. During the sale 28,100 bales of scoured and greasy wool were disposed of, the total value being 314,070 pounds. The advance on the rates of the last sales in June was remarkable. The average price for greasy was 11pounds 2s 9 1-2d a bale and 8.15d a pound, compared with 7 pounds 1s 10d and 5.22d at the June sale, while the figures for both greasy and scoured were 11 pounds 3s 6 1-2d and 7 pounds 1s 11d a bale although the top price was only 131-4 lb, a most satisfactory feature was the quantity sold at prices between 12d and 10d a pound.

The quality of the wool was fine proof of the fact that South Australian pastoralists and breeders are maintaining their flocks at a high level as regards quality despite recent disappointing prices for wool. Further evidence in the same direction was forthcoming at the Melbourne Show at which South Australian breeders had outstanding success in the fine wool sections.

BOUNTY OF THE FIELDS

Agricultural officials estimate that, given another month of favorable weather with a little more rain, the State's harvest will exceed 50 million bushels, compared with last year's record of 48 millions. The first shipment probably will be made from port Germein next month. Experts of the Department of Agriculture calculate that in the Murray Mallee districts the yield will be from 15 to 20 per cent. heavier than that of last year, and on Yorke Peninsula and the Murray Flats 10 per cent. In some parts of the northern farming country it may be scarcely as heavy, but in the drier districts it will be heavier. Preliminary reports from Eyre Peninsula, which last season contributed nearly a quarter of the State's total return, indicate that in several of the favored districts paddocks will return from 35 to 40 bushels an acre. In some cases oats there are more than seven feet in height and wheat has reached five feet.

WEALTH AT THE SHOW

The success of the Adelaide Show was a reflection of these favorable circumstances. The total attendance was 238,600 only 23,000 below the record of the boom year, 1929. This show established records with 12,000 entries and with 60,750 for a single day's attendance. The receipts, which were much better than those of 1931, owed much to the attendance of country people, who, in view of the better outlook for primary production, felt that they could afford a holiday.

MORE RAILWAY REVENUE AND FEWER UNEMPLOYED

Other reflexes of the improved position of the State's staple industries are the constantly improving railway position, and the decrease in the number of persons receiving Government relief. Every week witnesses a further step toward removing South Australia's most dangerous incubus, a huge railway deficit, and last week's figures showed an improvement of nearly 6,000 pounds on those for the same period of 1931. The position regarding relief shows a similarly satisfactory progressive movement. In September there were 9218 fewer people receiving rations than in the same month last year and the cost had decreased 5728 pounds weekly. Compared with a maximum of 32,300, the number receiving sustenance now is 23,000.
