## Curley Says Dempsey Free From Kearns

BANFF, Alta., Aug. 28.—The Dempsey-Kearns newspaper controversy is a joke. Jack Dempsey is legally and fully freed from the engagement with Jack Kearns. I have just come from Dempsey's home in Los Angeles, where I saw the legal agreement in which the champion settled \$100,000 on his former manager to remove his yoke. Jack Curley, famous boxing promoter, made this statement in an interview here today.

"While it is assured that Dempsey will fight within the next year no one can say when he will fight. The million dollar contract which Dempsey recently signed with Floyd Fitzsimmons to meet Harry Wills, was expected solely for the purpose of staying off for the time being the ruling of the New York Boxing Commission, which had disqualified Dempsey in New York for refusing to meet Harry Wills," said Mr. Curley.

## THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, Aug. 28.—The export trade in Canadian grain on the Montreal market today was reported very quiet. There being practically no demand for foreign buyers. There was some inquiry from New York exporters for No. 3 Northern wheat at 27 1/2 cents per bushel over the Winnipeg October option C. I. F. Montreal and sales No. 3 Canadian Western standard were made at 17 cents per bushel over C. I. F. and No. 3 Canadian Western at nine cents per bushel over C. I. F., while American milling barley sold at 76 1/2 cents per bushel.

There is practically no change in the tone of the Canadian egg market. Evidence that the season of short production is drawing near is given in reports from various centres. Calgary is still drawing heavily on storage supplies. Toronto shows no change. Country shippers are paying extras 33, firsts 31, seconds 25. Montreal is gaining strength due to cooler weather. Shippers are asking extras 36, firsts 33 1/2, seconds 28 1/2.

Calgary egg market conditions are unchanged with receipts very light and storage stocks being depleted to fill the demand, extras 32, firsts 28, seconds 25. No change is expected during next week. Edmonton unchanged. Jobbing extras 40, firsts 36, seconds 32, poultry receipts light, dealers paying spring extras 16, fowl 14. Vancouver is firm and prices steady with dealers paying light, N. B. wholesale extras 42, country points extras 39, firsts 40, seconds 35.
