Premier Stewart's Temperance Act Best Of Its Kind In The Whole Of Canada

IS THE OPINION OF WELL-KNOWN PROHIBITION LEADERS

Certain well-known Prohibition leaders in the Maritime Provinces after making a careful study of the principles of Premier Stewart's proposed Temperance Act declared that from the standpoint of a liquor control act it is the best of its kind in the Dominion of Canada.

One of these men declared himself in the following manner: "While I am a Prohibitionist—brought up after the strictest sort—and while nothing short of Prohibition—in the strictest sense—would satisfy me, I must confess that after a careful examination of the principles of the proposed Stewart Act, I am free to state that in my opinion it is the safest, the strictest and the most human Act in Canada today.

HUMAN, I say, because it is manifestly intended in this Act—to safeguard the home to the fullest extent to which an Act of this sort can go.

"I believe Premier Stewart will push as far as possible every means within his power to make the Act an instrument that will cut in every direction; an Act that will not be merely a symbol of law but a real living force to protect the liberties of the Island citizens, and to punish to the utmost limits of the law all who dare tramp upon the rights and privileges of British subjects. So far as these great virtues and powers can be operated under a Control Act, I believe Premier Stewart has worked out a real achievement in a Liquor Control Act."

The Prohibition Commissions Compared

The record of The Patriot in its attempts to deceive uninformed readers in respect to matters under discussion during election campaign is pretty well known.

One of the leading features lately has been a black type article which seeks to show that the present Prohibition Commission, at the instigation of the Stewart Government, have been lax in their administration of the Prohibition Act in order that the Act might be discredited.

To reasonable people the facts seem to indicate quite the opposite. The present Commission kept in office the Chief Inspector and his chief Assistant who were in office under the Liberals.

But under the Liberals Chief Inspector Barbour held also an appointment as Excise Enforcement Officer of the Dominion Customs Department. At the end of 1923 the Liberal Government at Ottawa cancelled this appointment, thereby greatly lessening his authority and adding to the difficulties of making prosecutions; and although repeatedly requested by the Prohibition Commission to re-appoint him in his office, absolutely refused to do so. This was in the days of the Customs Scandals at Ottawa, in the days when smuggling was flagrantly abetted by the Liberal minister and his officials.

But notwithstanding this the records show as follows:—

SEARCHES MADE

Under the former Commission there were 321 searches made in 1922 and 373 searches made in 1923.

Under the present Commission there were 400 searches made in 1924, 425 searches made in 1925 and 507 searches made in 1926. That does not look like greater laxity of enforcement.

CONVICTIONS SECURED

Under the former Commission there were 55 convictions in 1921, 56 convictions in 1922, and 47 convictions in 1923.

Under the present Commission there were 59 convictions in 1924, 103 convictions in 1925, and 72 convictions in 1926. That does not look like greater laxity of enforcement, with many more searches made and many more convictions secured.

Under the former Commission there were never more than four inspectors at work. Under the present Commission there were never less than four inspectors and for a considerable period there were six inspectors at work, Chief Inspector Barbour continuing throughout the period. That does not look like greater laxity of enforcement.

THEN AS TO SALES

According to The Patriot's own figures the sales in the year 1920 amounted to \$175,777.81, and these had increased by 1926 to \$189,106.89. For a time in the interim, particularly in 1922, the sales by the commission were smaller. But The Patriot neglects to explain that at that period the Liberals were collecting license at the rate of \$5,000 per year each, from four liquor export houses doing business in Charlottetown, the total amount of the license collected in the year 1921 alone being \$19,541.66. These houses were supposedly licensed to do an export business. But everybody who knows anything about conditions in Charlottetown at that time knows that the liquor from these four export houses was being distributed all over the Province.

These four houses were paying the Liberal Government license at the rate of twenty thousand dollars a year and they were making fortunes for their owners. Is it any wonder that the sales of the Commission Vendors were somewhat smaller when these houses were in operation in Charlottetown?

And it must be remembered, too, that while the Liberals were in power Prince Edward Island had its period of acute depression—business houses were failing and many farmers had extreme difficulty in getting enough money with which to pay their bills. There were low prices for produce, times were bad, farmers were staying at home and many of them hadn't the money available to spend in buying doctors' "scripts" and liquor of any kind. In good times such as Prince Edward Island is enjoying at present there is bound to be more money spent for liquor than in hard times, no matter what law is on the statute books or what Government is in power.

For the Patriot, or any Liberal speaker in any church or elsewhere, to say or insinuate that the Stewart Government has ever at any time in any way interfered with the administration of the Prohibition Law by the Prohibition Commission is nothing but the grossest slander.

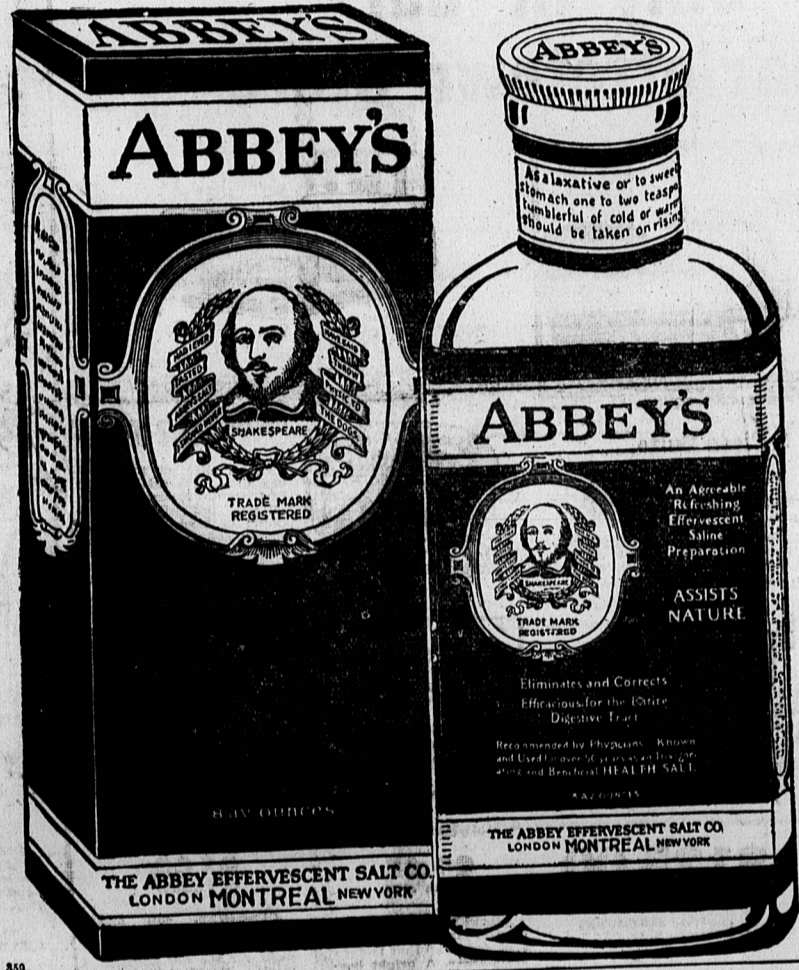

8 OUT OF 9 WOMEN BELIEVE PROHIBITION A FAILURE

Rupert Hughes, the well-known writer in an article on "Female Bosses, Now a Power in the Arena of Politics," appearing in this week's Boston Globe says:

It might have been expected that women would be solidly behind the prohibition movement, but even this violent effort to dry up the drunkards has not found the sex agreed. The W. C. T. U., of course, has always been an organization of anti-alcoholic motives, but countless women agree with countless men that prohibition does not help temperance.

A year or more ago all three of the women in Congress were in favor of a modification of the Volstead act. And a recent poll of the Women's National Republican Club showed an astonishing inclination to the "wet" side—though it is a misnomer to call the anti-prohibitionists "wets" since their main objection to the Volstead law is its costly and disastrous wetness.

But a "dry" by any other name would be as wet, and the pretensions of the Anti-Saloon League have ceased to impress an immense number of people who believe in temperance and abhor drunkenness, but also believe in liberty and abhor tyranny. When ballots were sent out to members of the Women's National Republican League, 863 of the first 900 who returned ballots voted that the Volstead Act had decreased the public respect for law; 817 voted that public morals had suffered.
