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COMPLAINT FROM THE CAPE BRETON ATHLETES

Mr. S. F. Doyle, President of Maritime Province Branch Answers Reproduced Article Written by Sydney Record Sports Editor Some Time Ago - The Situation in a Nutshell.

By "TEC" Mr. S. F. Doyle, President of the Maritime Branch of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada was interviewed last evening with reference to the reproduction of an article which appeared in the Sydney Record about a week ago and written by John P. Connolly, Sports Editor of that paper.

Mr. Doyle stated that the article in part takes exception to the way some things are done by the M. P. B. and accuses Mr. Doyle and other officials for discrimination.

Mr. Doyle stated as to what he had to say on the matter replied: "I was very much surprised last evening to read the reproduction of the above mentioned article and I may say after reading it through (for Mr. Connolly's benefit) that at the meeting of the Maritime Province Branch at Amherst at which the Sydney man in question was a delegate, it was not my intention to run for the Presidency in the election before the election of officers took place I spoke eulogistically of the good work President Covey had done during that year and did my best to influence the meeting in his behalf. However at the last moment when Mr. Covey refused to run I would not barter my chance of election in favor of Mr. Millie whom I considered a weak candidate.

I may say that at the meeting last year in Halifax when elected President of the M. P. B. I made it quite clear that I would do all that was possible to make the man who was now under the banner and classified as (Class B) athlete. When Mr. Connolly states that I, as President have the power to have said cases adjusted and cards granted I can only say that I should spend some of his time in studying the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada constitution and bye-laws before making himself ridiculous as a sport writer. Again when

Mr. Connolly states that I had voted reinstatement of Lester Lowther of Amherst, a man now in the category of a (Class A) professional, he writes a deliberate lie, as my knowledge of the fundamentals governing amateurism would not permit me to make such a heinous mistake. And once again he states that "Cape Breton has been discriminated against, votes bartered, robbed right and left of every semblance of justice, and what they will and will not tolerate any longer." While such language is nice to read, after analysis, such does not amount to anything. Mr. Doyle further stated that Mr. Connolly connected Mr. Covey in any way with the work of the M. P. B. he has another thing coming, and so far as I am concerned I have not as yet, nor even do I intend to take as my adviser in amateur athletics any of the (knowing ones) in either Nova Scotia or New Brunswick.

I may say that I am and have been for years one of the most active members of the executive of the M. P. B. who has come out boldly in favor of the Maritime Athlete receiving back his amateur status. Mr. Doyle went on to say, if Mr. Connolly knew anything regarding this I would consider him a worthy foe. But for the benefit of those young sport writers who take too many things for granted rather than seek knowledge from those informed, I may say that the M.P.B. is only a branch and a (Class A) athlete has no chance of being reinstated. Mr. Connolly states that I, as President have the power to have said cases adjusted and cards granted I can only say that I should spend some of his time in studying the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada constitution and bye-laws before making himself ridiculous as a sport writer. Again when

Mr. Harris of the Y. M. C. A. asked me to use my influence in having the Y. M. C. A. basketball team play off for the Maritime title after writing Mr. Quigley my views on the issue, I was arranged and Sydney was allowed to play the night. I may also say that Sydney's men now seeking reinstatement will receive every consideration when their cases come up before the Registration Committee of Canada which meets in Sain: John next September. In the case of the late Grace Day when he follows the instructions as laid down in Mr. Quigley's letters to him, it is only a question of a short time when he will receive his amateur card.

To prove to Mr. Connolly and to my many friends in Cape Breton that I am most anxious to help amateurism there, allow me to publish "Mr. Reporter" the following telegram:

Dr. A. S. Lamb, Secy. of A. A. U. of C. McGill University, Montreal, Que., Cape Breton seeks redress, psychological moment to clear up conditions there. If you grant me authority to issue cards to several who have been under the ban since 1923 and whose cases never received full consideration. Remember this is the first time in twenty years that amateurism has had any sway in Cape Breton; diplomacy must be used, otherwise our good work will receive a serious jolt. Give authority from the M. P. B. Executive to deal with this matter personally, and after receiving reports from influential gentlemen from various Cape Breton centres, I strongly urge you to grant my request before it is too late. Answer as soon as possible.

Signed S. F. DOYLE President M.P.B.A.A.U. of C. The writer at Mr. Doyle's request had a copy of above telegram produced at the local Western Union.

Mr. Doyle remarked, surely this does not seem like discrimination against Cape Breton, and in conclusion allow me to say that the M. P. B. constitution and bye-laws have been more strictly adhered to by the present regime than by the past, and I am in no way embarrassed for the sins supposed to have been committed by any of the past presidents who may have tried to seek prominence in athletic circles by promising requests beyond their jurisdiction. He added, it has been a pleasure for me to intercede for the fallen athlete and during my term it is my object to do all I can to help the cause of the suspended athlete who having repented of his deed seeks a return to the amateur field.

"A General Lockout" LONDON, May 13.—"There is now a general lockout." This is how railway men standing outside Euston Station summed up this morning's position.

All the railwaymen reported for duty this morning but they were asked to sign agreements by which they entered the service afresh and forfeited all past year's service. By breaking old contracts they were to lose their pension rights and they would come under a lower wage scale by which each man would lose from six to ten shillings weekly.

The union has instructed the men not to sign this agreement and none have done so.

Conditions of Re-employment Continued from page 1. of the strike by the workers caused disappointment on the Stock Exchange and business was sluggish all day. Quotations, where they could be ascertained, were generally steady.

There were no signs, however, of attempts to sell stocks, and the hope was expressed that both sides would get together and arrange matters amicably.

Hundreds of Small Strikes. LONDON, May 13.—Great Britain today was confronted with hundreds of small but serious strikes of individual unions or groups of union men as an aftermath of the general strike which was called off yesterday.

Employers are refusing to reinstate strikers except on the employers' terms. Because of that situation the House of Commons debate this evening may become the most important of the strike period in its ability finally to direct the country toward peace or war.

Bevin Optimistic Earnest Bevin, President of the Transport Workers Union, spoke the only optimistic words heard today. "There is friction in some quarters," he told the United Press.
