THE SITUATION IN QUEBEC.

The situation in Quebec where the Opposition as such refused to contest a single seat at the coming general election ought not to be taken too seriously. The like will not occur in any other Province of Canada. It is safe to say that in any one of the six English-speaking Provinces His Majesty's loyal Opposition will always come to time and put up a fight whether the notice be long or short, and however desperate the chances. The fact is that our French compatriots have not yet fully caught the spirit of British representative institutions. With them the idea of an Opposition as a necessary part of the machinery of parliamentary Government, and without regard to the chances of capturing the treasury benches, is one in which they can see no utility. And anyway it will not make much difference that the Quebec Conservatives do not choose to contest the elections. Just now in the present temper of the people they will win about as many seats by not contesting for them as they would if they contested every constituency. Ten years hence it may be very different.

THE MANITOBA LISTS.

The Liberal Winnipeg Free Press explains, or attempts to explain how it was that names were found to be struck off and others added to the electoral lists on polling day. We give it for what it may be worth:—
 "In some constituencies the Dominion polling booths did not correspond with the Provincial booths; and as the lists were made to suit the latter they had to be re-arranged to suit the new boundaries. In this re-arranging, it goes without saying, the right of every elector to his franchise should have been preserved; and we have no doubt it will be found that this was done. Most of the trouble was caused by electors, in place of reading the proclamation and ascertaining where they should vote, going to the wrong poll and insisting upon voting there."
 At this distance we have no sufficient means of knowing what the defence is really worth. We presume the charge will be sifted to the bottom and the facts brought to light before the matter is done with. In any case, and whether the Manitoba Conservatives were in large numbers deprived of their votes or not, the result throughout the Dominion seems to justify the Montreal Herald's frequent vaunt that "Canada is with Laurier."

STEEL SHIPBUILDING.

"Now or never for steel shipbuilding," is the way the Maritime Merchant puts it. Nova Scotia has returned a solid phalanx of Liberals; Mr. Fielding is very anxious that the scheme shall go forward; it has been agitated for years; a preliminary organization was formed years ago, and options obtained on properties in Dartmouth for a location; the Dartmouth Town Council, the City Council of Halifax and the Provincial Government of Nova Scotia years ago voted bounties, which are still available, and now all that is wanted is for the Dominion Government to grant the necessary further bonus, and this, of course Mr. Fielding cannot well refuse. With three subsidies and a bonus the project ought to go. Such is the argument and the prospect as The Maritime Merchant sees it.

THE WORLD'S FAIR.

The World's Fair at St. Louis is still going on but nearing its close. It has been a marvellous show in many respects but in point of attendance has fallen very far below the fair of 1893. From April 30 to October 30 the total attendance at the St. Louis fair was 15,983,265, while from May 1 to October 30 the attendance at the Chicago fair was 27,330,251. This may be partly due to various causes, including the presidential election, which no doubt kept some hundreds of possible visitors otherwise occupied. We incline to think with the New York Tribune that the frequency of World's Fairs in recent years has worn off the keen edge of public curiosity. Some other new sensation of world-wide interest must be substituted until the visiting public have had a rest from the surfeit of World's Expositions.

We have yet heard nothing from Leader Mathieson on the Prohibition License Question.

Why the delay in extending the rails to the Plant Line Wharf? And where is Hon. Mr. Emmerson? When is he coming? Is he really coming at all?

It appears from an Ottawa despatch to the Montreal Herald that Mr. Aylesworth K. C. who was defeated in Durham, Ont. will not now enter the Cabinet but will devote himself to his law practice.

Some idea of the growth of Winnipeg during the present year may be formed from the fact that the building permits for the year make a total of \$9,100,000. And an even greater expansion is predicted for 1905.

The New York Globe has grasped a great truth when it sets down that "a mistake will be made by the American press and people if Sir Wilfrid Laurier's great triumph in the Canadian election is set down as a victory for closer trade relations with the United States."

Says The Maritime Merchant: There should be an uninterrupted service summer and winter between the Island and the mainland. In summer the trains and steamers should be equipped with the necessary refrigerator facilities and there should be cold storage warehouses at suitable points to facilitate the forwarding of fresh meats in good condition.
