Santos Dumont now has his airship safely housed at Brighton Beach, Coney Island, and is shortly to make a trial trip around the Statue of Liberty at the entrance to New York harbor.

It is now time that the man in the 38 foot kerosene launch who set out three weeks ago from New York to cross the Atlantic arrived on the other side. Capt. Newman and his 16 year old son are on board, but the craft belongs to A. A. Low, brother of Mayor Seth Low of New York.

At length the long-delayed concession for the extension of the Cape-to-Cairo Railway from Rhodesia through the Congo Free State has been obtained. The survey will begin at an early date. It is provided in the contract that 40 per cent of the plant shall be purchased in Great Britain.

Since the famous waterspout which caused a shower of frogs in a rural district of Prince Edward Island last year Canada has been pretty clear from waterspouts, cyclones tornados. But last Saturday a tornado is reported to have passed over St. Catharines, Ont. which lifted houses into the air, chawed off telegraph poles and hurled railway cars off the track. Amid the wreck and ruin that it caused it is remarkable that no one was killed. As it well known the real home of the tornado and the cyclone is across the border, and it is about time the Ottawa Government gave Uncle Sam official notice to keep all his wild animals of his sort on his own side of the line fence. It is too bad that they have been permitted to occasionally cross the line without remonstrance. All foreign cyclones, whether thoroughbreds, or grades ought to be taxed at least 100 per cent, without any bondidg privilege.

An electric automobile is now being tested in England, which will run 100 miles without recharging its storage battery. It is so arranged that when running down hill of its own weight the motors are reversed and become generators to recharge the battery. At the same time this has the effect of braking the car so that the ordinary brakes are very seldom necessary.

The dark places of the earth are still the habitations of cruelty. This is true of southern China from which very sad reports are received. The famine in the Province of Hainan has caused many parents to sell their daughters into slavery. Many of them to escape this awful fate are committing suicide. The usual method is said to be for six or eight girls to tie themselves together and throw themselves into the water. Six hundred girls are reported to have committed suicide in this manner in Hainan.

The King's new automobile was made by the Daimler Motor Company, and was built at Coventry. It will carry six persons with two more on the driving seat. It is not of high speed, the maximum capacity being 36 miles an hour. Its motor is a 24 horse-power four-cylinder engine. The brakes are made to operate equally whether the car is running forward or backward. The pneumatic tires are five inches in diameter. The car has quite recently been delivered from the factory.

The Boston Traveller tells of how the coal trust, the strike, and the advance on the price of fuel pinch the poor in that city. The very poor buy their coal in small quantities, and The Traveller tells that a small water pail full of coal costs 15 cents now-a-days, where it formerly cost 10 cents. This is at the rate of \$18 a ton. The small coal dealer is not averse to profiting by any rise in price that may occur, so when coal advanced in cost to \$8 a ton from \$6, many of the small dealers added 10 cents to the price per basket, or 25c, so that now they make more money than they did at the old scale of prices. Coal is higher in Boston now than at any time within the past fifteen years. This is a matter of small consequence to the rich but to the poor it is almost a matter of life and death. It may really be that when the cold weather comes on. No country has fuel in greater abundance than the United States but the wealth of fuel thus stored up by nature for the benefit of all is held by the trusts and doled out to the poor at blood-money prices.

The Finance Minister of France has succeeded in converting more than a thousand millions of French bonds, or rentes from a 3 1/2 to a 3 per cent basis. But he only effected this by giving the holders of the bonds about 15 months' interest for the current year and stipulating that no further reduction shall be made in the rate of interest for a long term of years to come. There is no national debt in the world so heavy as that which the people of France are carrying and the rate of interest is still much higher than that which the British national debt pays. British consols, formerly paying 3 per cent were reduced in 1890 to 2 1/2 and in 1893 to their present rate of 2 1/2 per cent.

It is needless to say that in publishing the letter of Huxanlity, referring to a recent operation for appendicitis in a rural district of this Province, The Guardian had no thought of reflecting upon the skillful practitioners who performed the operation in question. In all such matters surgeons must be guided by their best judgment, and where they think recovery is almost impossible without recourse to the knife, are bound to give the patient the benefit of even the slight chance which an operation may afford. Harsh criticisms by other members of the profession in cases where death may follow an operation are to be severely reprehended.
