**EX-CONSTABLE PRAISES BYNG**

LONDON, March 18.—A striking tribute to the personality of Lord Byng, former Governor-General of Canada, and now Chief Commissioner of the Metropolitan Police, appears in the Police Review from ex-Sergeant Josling. Josling was dismissed from the force some years ago for making charges of corruption against Sergeant Goddard, which were found a few weeks ago to be substantiated, Goddard receiving a prison sentence. An offer of reinstatement was declined by Josling, who has become a school teacher.  
 Josling in the Police Review discusses the factors which help to maintain the tone and encourage confidence in individual policemen to do the right thing, and refers to the discovery he had been permitted to make, "that at New Scotland Yard there is a man in charge of twenty thousand policemen who knows how to shake the hand of a constable as if he were a comrade; a man who has courage of expression and action."  
 Referring to his own situation, Josling says the volume of expressions of astonishment that his salary as a schoolmaster is less than a constable's, shows the public conscience has been stirred in the matter.
