It is a well known fact that large sums of money came into the Island. Large monies were offered and accepted by women who had as much right to accept money as the men. These women have reasons for so accepting money. The question is—Is it right for women to accept money for votes? Are politics improved by women's franchise? A woman who accepts a bribe will she sell other things for far deeper significance than the franchise? A cordial welcome to all interested in this subject.

The Canadian Mail Contractors Assoc.

The Rural Mail Contractors throughout Canada will, through their secretary and General Agent of the Association, Mr. Garfield MacKinnon of Guelph, Ontario, petition the Government, for several much-needed reforms, in connection with the performance of their duty, while the Solicitor of the Association, Mr. J. C. M. Getman, of German and Lennox, Toronto, will present strong argument before the Government, in support of the following changes:

Firstly: Abolition of the Contract System and the introduction in its place of a salary paid system, where the members of the Association will be placed on a permanent salary basis of engagement at the rate of \$70.00 per mile per year for the Rural Mail contractors and the contractors operating between post offices and post offices.

Secondly: An increase for the Contractors operating between Post Offices and Railway Stations of three times the present contract price, these contracts representing a very short distance and a very trifling income, one entirely inadequate for the responsibility of the work performed.

Thirdly: That the Permanency of occupation on a Salary Paid System at the above mentioned rates of increase will be continuous to the Carrier, consequent upon good service being rendered, and where, when the Carrier has been in the service for two months will be considered sufficient notice to terminate his engagement.

Fourthly: That the increased rates of the future will operate backwards to take in the period of time since Jan. 1st, 1917, so as to reimburse the contractors for some of their many losses sustained in carrying on the work when the cost of performing the service was so abnormally high, during the years of the war, and the post-war period.

Fifthly: That the Mail Contractors will be given ten statutory holidays with full salary payment, the same as are now enjoyed by all other Branches of the Postal Department, as well as all other Governmental Departments throughout Canada.

Sixthly: That all Rural Mail Boxes now located on the left-hand side of the roadway, will be placed on the right-hand side of every roadway, throughout the different Provinces of Canada. This change to prevent any further loss of life or serious accidents, many having happened in recent years requiring lengths of hospital treatment, and causing considerable loss of time and expense.

There is no other part of the Government Service in Canada where men are employed under contract, and where the positions, are publicly tendered for, and at such scandalously low income.

The City Letter Carriers, Postal Clerks in City Post Offices, Railway Mail Clerks, Postmasters, and Janitors who have no running equipment to maintain, all receive an income several times bigger on the average than the Rural Mail Contractor who has to maintain his whole running equipment, which on the average route of 20 miles, consists of two horses and rigs, and the maintenance cost of which has been considerably more than the average income received from the contract; hence the need of granting the Mail Contractors as asked for by the Mail Contractors Association. It is expected that the Post-master General and the Government will see the necessity of granting the above mentioned changes, all of which are very much needed, and in the interest of public service.

Misses Dorothy and Pauline Gaudet, Charlottetown are at present attending St. Mary's Convent, Souris.


Miss Bessie Gillan of the firm of Matthew & McLean, Ltd., Souris is spending a vacation with relatives in St. John.
