Speakers At Sessions

(Continued from Page 1) 4th Armored—in England, although he was recalled to Canada before his return to the United States. "Worthy" and "Old Freddie" was also called, was recognized as the father of armored units in Canada. Long before Canada had any tanks, Major F. F. Penhale, near Barrie, Ont., his Canadian home town—the native Scot was known by army privates as "the tank man" for his breakfast, dinner and supper.

There, in 1938, he got together a set of mechanical freaks that fairly resembled tanks, and did as much tank research as he could. He was permitted. He also engineered the first "RYP" (roll, yaw, pitch, alter course), a tankman's equivalent to the airman's Link Trainer.

When the 4th Division was converted to an armored division in 1942, he was given the job of retraining and taking it overseas, and his men, many of whom he knew by their first names, grew familiar with the command. He was likely to turn up anywhere, at any time, to point out a minor mistake and help them repair a tank.

Popular with his men because he agreed vehemently with Napoleon in the belief that "there are not poor soldiers. There are poor officers," he was a strict disciplinarian. In 1944, he was placed in command of Pacific Command and after the war was given his present post.

Enlisted as Private

During the First Great War he enlisted as a private in the Black Watch, a Scottish Highland regiment, at the front from 1915 until the war's end, except for a short period in hospital after being wounded. When hostilities ceased, he was discharged in 1918.

Brig. Penhale is a permanent force gunner who has been in the Canadian Army since graduating from Royal Military College in 1918. He has served in various appointments on the Prairies and during the Second World War he commanded the Third Brigade of the 1st Division during the Sicily invasion and subsequently served as deputy chief of the General Staff in England and Ottawa.

Brig. Morton now takes over a command in Saskatchewan, Manitoba, and Northwestern Ontario, which he knows well, having previously been district officer commanding M. D. 10 (Manitoba) and more recently brigadier in charge of administration, Prairie Command.

Like Brig. Penhale whom he succeeds, he has spent his entire career as a Canadian Army officer, belonging also to the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery. His record includes service overseas during the First World War and staff and gunnery instructor postings in Western Canada between the two wars. His service during the
