MCLARRIN ARRIVES IN NEW YORK

Still Shaky Following Narrow Escape From Plane Crash.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, May 7.—Jimmy McLarrin, despite his Irish heritage, isn't likely ever to be superstitious again.

The Vancouver beak-buster rode seat 13 of plane No. 13, first section of the Sky Chief out of Albuquerque headed for Kansas City, points east, and his welterweight title defence against Barney Ross here May 28. There were 13 passengers. But it was the second section, trailing them through the fog by only half an hour, that crashed in Missouri, killing Senator Bronson Cutting and four others.

McLarrin, arriving here by train today from Chicago to start training for his third match with the dedicated lightweight champion, will feel a bit shaky.

"We had a bad time ourselves with that fog," Jimmy explained. "We were all awake as we came near Kansas City, and we were joking about the being 13 passengers. Someone said one of us ought to get out for the general good of the rest."

"Over the landing field at Kansas City our pilot found a hole in the fog and came down all right. I didn't know until we had flown on to Chicago that the second plane didn't have our luck, couldn't get down, and had to go on into the fog."

"On the train out of Chicago for New York I sat behind a man who was reading all about the accident and one headline said 'McLarrin reported dead in crash.'"

"The man was shaking his head, and he said to another man with him, 'Isn't that too bad. He was a nice boy and a good fighter too.'"

Tie For Honors In Bowling Tournament

B., May 7.—Saint John Y.M.C.A. drew into a first place tie with Black's, also of this city, late tonight in the Martime-Eastern Maine three-day bowling tournament here when they defeated Saint John Centrals by 51 pins to score their second win in two matches today.

Doctor Revives Girl Apparently Dead

OWEN SOUND, Ont., May 7.—A five-year-old girl who died following an operation today was "brought back to life" by an injection of adrenalin into the heart several minutes later and was believed on the way to recovery.

Little Audrey Brown, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond A. Brown, Owen Sound, was operated on for double mastoid by Dr. A. F. Laird, Owen Sound specialist. A recent illness of scarlet fever had left her heart in a weakened condition.

A few minutes after the operation a nurse rushed to the doctor and told him the patient was dead.

Dr. Laird examined the child. He found no heart action and no breathing. The girl's eyes were glassy.

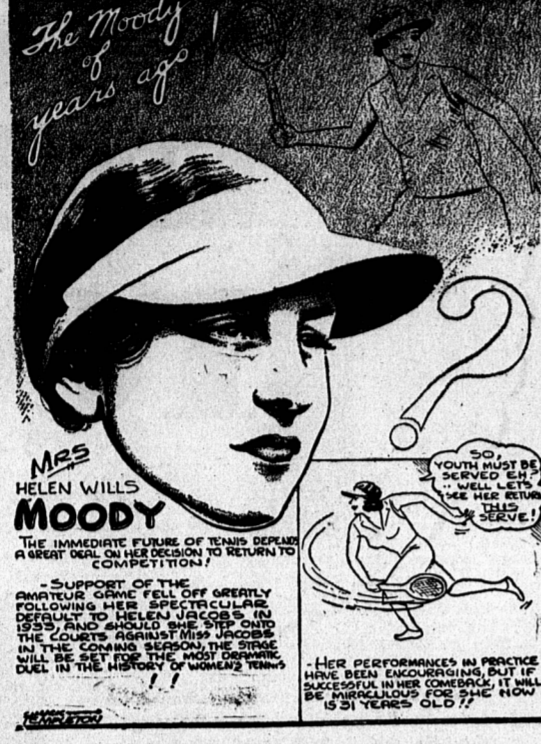

Coastguardsmen Respond To Distress Call

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, May 7.—Rain-swept and fog-bound waters off the New Jersey coast, where the Morris Castle was wrecked, were today searched fruitfully today by coast guard vessels answering the distress call of an unidentified ship.

As the search continued coast guard headquarters suspected the distressed call picked up at New York and Bay Head, N. J., might have been a hoax. The faint plea for help was intercepted by short wave wireless at 40 degrees.

Authorities recalled that "rum runners" along the Atlantic coast, "run rum" frequently in the short wave distress calls to draw coast guard officers out of position.

Alden W. Smith, 26 year old law student, intercepted the call in New York early today. He notified police. Meanwhile, the Bay Head coast guard station picked up the call.

Answering the call which said the ship could keep afloat about two hours, the coast guard put out two cutters, two patrol boats and four power life boats. Two airplanes from the Cape May, N. J. station skimmed the area without sighting the ship or wreckage.

It was after the search had progressed for many hours that the coast guard suspected a ruse. The "ships" message was signed "XXX" and "Pal". Officials said they checked revealed no vessel listed with those call letters or by the name of "Pal".

"Piccolo Pete" Committed To Trial

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, Ont., May 7.—Protesting his innocence in a dramatic courtroom hearing, Max K. F. M. today was committed for trial on charges of kidnapping John S. Labatt and armed robbery.

The slim, almost bald "Piccolo Pete" of Covington, Ky., rose in the courtroom to make his dramatic protest, on the verge of tears, blurted out:

"I have only one thing to say. I can look Mr. Labatt in the eye and tell him he is making the greatest mistake ever made in his country."

Today's hearing revolved largely about Labatt's identification of Murray as one of three men who abducted him last Aug. 14 on a road between Seattle and London.

Bermudan Cricket Team To Visit Canada

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, May 7.—Arrangements have been completed for the visit of a Bermudan cricket team to Eastern Canada, playing the first game at Montreal, July 25, and concluding the tour at either Chatham or London by Aug. 8.

James F. Murray, Secretary of the Bermudan Athletic Association, under whose direction the tour will be made, stated tonight that the prospective team will be stronger than that which came here four years ago. At least seven of the members were chosen two years ago to play against Sir Julien Cahm's team when it visited Bermuda.

The itinerary will include Montreal, July 25-27; Ottawa, July 29-30; Toronto, July 31 and Aug. 3-6; St. Catharines, Aug. 1-2; London, Aug. 7-8.

Several matches will be played in New York prior to and following the Canadian tour.

COLLINS SOLD TO CARDS

"Manager Jimmy Wilson has decided to string along with the young pitchers," President Gerry Nugent disclosed in announcing the deal.

Moderate Parties Hold Confidence Of French Voters

(By Guardian's Special Wire) PARIS, May 7.—The moderate parties now in power still hold the confidence of most of the voters of France, despite slight gains by both the extreme left and the extreme right in yesterday's local elections throughout the country.

All the members of the government running for local offices were elected except former Premier Edouard Herriot, now minister without portfolio, and his re-election as Mayor of Lyon, when the run-off vote is held next week, was believed assured. He has been Mayor of Lyon for the last 20 years.

Analysis of the returns showed that while the communists had made slight gains, the socialists lost control of many important towns. They kept control of the local Council of Toulouse, but lost Bordeaux, where the majority passed to Adrien Marquet's Neo-Socialists.

Seats for city councilmen were filled in only 46 of the 82 larger cities of the republic, while 53 of the 93 seats in Paris remain to be filled in the runoff ballot next Sunday.

Expect Protest Over Seizure Of N. S. Motorship

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) BOSTON, May 5.—Federal officials stated here on Saturday they expected a protest from the Canadian Government over seizure of the Nova Scotia motorship Accuracy.

The Accuracy, no protest had been received in Boston tonight.

In revealing Saturday that such a protest was looked for, the authorities did not indicate what grounds they believed it might be based on.

The Accuracy, a motorship out of Yarmouth, was seized Thursday at South Dartmouth, Mass., as she was out-bound. No liquor was found aboard the vessel but the next day a large quantity of alcohol was confiscated in a South Dartmouth farm house.

Declares Innocence

"DIZZY" SAYS CARDINALS CAN'T LOSE

The Talkative Dean Figures It Out In Interview.

By Edward J. Nell, Associated Press Sports Writer (By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, May 7.—J. Herman "Dizzy" Dean has things all figured out so New York Giants can't possibly win the National League pennant and St. Louis Cardinals can't possibly lose.

"It's this way," announced a very calm, reserved, statistical pitching expert as rain drummed down on New York City today. "The Giants got the best club in baseball. We're the world champions. We'll win close to 100 games this year. The Giants won't. That makes it."

As a matter of fact, J. Herman, who with brother Daffy was absolutely poison to the Giants last year, losing but two games between them to the New Yorkers all season, thinks Chicago Cubs are the most dangerous bunch the Cards must contend with.

"Freddy Fitzsimmons must win 15 games for the Giants if they're to stay up there. Joe Moore won't hit like he did last year. That's an old ball club. It's liable to come all apart any time, and Fitz may be the tipoff."

"Look at the records so far. We've been playing the toughest clubs in the League, the Cubs, Pirates and Reds. Against that kind of opposition we've won nine and lost seven. The Giants have been playing much weaker teams, Phillies, Braves, Brooklyn. They've won nine and lost three. We won as many as they did, and look who we beat."

Dizzy figures he and brother Daffy will win 40 games between them, that Lefty Willie Walker, who has already won three, will win at least a dozen more and Wild Bill Hallahan will be good for another 15. He rates Bud Tinning good for 10, Gene Harts, and the rest of the staff 10 more. That totals 95 games, and the Cards won last year with 94.

"See?" says Dizzy. "We can't lose."

Six Miners Killed In Cave In

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 7.—Six hard coal miners plunged 500 feet to their death today when a cave-in crushed the cage in which they were riding to the top of a mine shaft.

The cage was within 100 feet of the top when something went wrong. A section of a side wall gave way and tons of rock, coal and earth fell on the cage. The cables snapped and the cage plummeted. The victims were crushed.

The accident occurred at the South Wilkesbarre colliery of the Glen Coal Company. The dead: James Johnson, Orville Roberts, Richard Owens, John Maidment, Nicholas Shields and Robert Walker. Robert Owens, also in the cage, was seriously injured.

Company records indicate about 20 children were made fatherless by the accident.

Laval Reports On Franco-Soviet Pact

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) PARIS, May 7.—Foreign Minister Pierre Laval today reported to the Cabinet on the newly-signed Franco-Russian mutual assistance pact and declared his nation's relations with Poland, also bound by treaty, had not been impaired.

The cabinet members had not planned to meet, a postponement having been projected because Premier Pierre Etienne Flandin today was operated upon to reset his arm, fractured in an automobile accident Saturday. The cabinet met at his insistence, however, and expressed wishes for his recovery.

The Premier spent a bad night before the surgeons decided an operation would be necessary to set the humerus (upper arm bone) and free the radio nerve which was caught in the fracture.

The operation was performed by Dr. Rene Dumas, who said the patient's condition was generally "excellent" but that he must remain in bed for several days. Flandin received messages of sympathy from leaders of other countries.
