

Local Old Timers Square Series With Summerside Vets

Scoring eleven runs in the fifth inning to add to their previous five, the ancient ball players of the City yesterday trounced their olden rivals from Summerside by a lopsided score of 16-3 before a large crowd of fans on the Memorial Field diamond. The win gave the locals an even break in the two game series with the Old Timers in the western capital. The visitors won the opening game in Summerside by an 8-6 count.

Yesterday afternoon amid the hollie that crept into the game the Charlottetown ball tossers banged out sixteen hits to show their all round superiority over the Summerside team. Prizes were awarded to various players on both teams for various accomplishments performed during the encounter.

Tom MacFarlane started on the mound for the locals and pitched three successful innings of ball against the visitors. He allowed three hits with one coming in each frame. Only one batter reached second against his tight pitching. He was relieved in the fourth by "Hap" Hobbs. Hobbs pitched two innings before giving away to "Carby" Carbone. "Doc" Noonan started on the mound for Summerside but was relieved in the second frame by Henry Bernard. Bernard gave way to "Tubby" Gay in the fourth.

Leading hitter of the game was the Charlottetown left fielder, catcher Fred "Husky" McCabe, who had three for four day at the plate. "Spookey" Cameron had two for two. Johnny Williams had two for three. "Shonny" Ross had two for three. Joe Ross was the only Summerside player to have more than one hit. He had two for four.

Spectacular Racing Again Big Feature Of Night Racing Meet

Spectacular racing duels, stunning upsets, and blanket finishes, all going to make a nerve-ringing harness race meet, were witnessed by over 3000 racing fans at Canada's Finest Track Saturday night as Carl Aubrey, Mary's Delight, Worthy Ermine, Lucky Number, Buddy Budlong, Kelly's Nightmare, Abner Brittain, Wait N'See, Babe Brittain and Tiny Budlong came through with victories in a program that kept the colorful racing crowd in a high state of excitement from the opening mile to the final one.

Once again it was racing of the highest order. Over a lightning-fast track and with perfect weather predominating, the different fields, being led out from wire to wire came through with some of the fastest heats of the year and in the galaxy of speed uncorked three horses took new win-race records.

Great Trotting Performance
 That grand old veteran Wait N'See, performing like a young colt on the trot, provided the greatest thrill to the crowd when he trotted off with the featured handicap event. Going away from scratch the doughty campaigner led from wire to wire; at the three quarters pole he was tested by the limit as the other four entries all came at him, but in the battle through the home stretch the bay colored son of Kalmuck, skillfully handled by Len O'Meara proved his worth when he staged the brilliant closing drive to win by a head. The mile was in 2:11 2-5 with the last half being in 1:04 2-5 and the last quarter in 32 seconds.

That was but one of the upset victories, but there were plenty others. In the very first heat over the card Carl Aubrey, last son of the famous Colonel Aubrey took himself a win tag of 2:19 2-5 in heading a field of eight. Trail-ing in the last position the first trip around the brilliantly lighted oval, Carl took off as they hit into the backstretch; he had forged to the front as they hit the seven-eighths pole and then had enough left to hurl back the closing challenges of the field and win by a comfortable length from the fast-closing Miss Cherry Valley, with the remainder pretty well bunched only a few strides back.

Worthy Ermine, with "Ike" Rhodola D. (Darryl) MacKinnon came within a fifth of the record she took at Montague when she headed the five-horse field in the seventh race. Getting away well driver-MacKinnon took her round the field and into the lead by the time they hit up the back side the first trip; coming by the stands she jumped it off to lose the lead temporarily to Ohio Hal but she came back on even keel by the time the turn had been reached; she took over in the backstretch again and from there to the wire made every post a winning one, and was looking for pacers as she breezed down the stretch.

Buddy Budlong, sending one of his best seasons, added another upset victory to the card by trotting off with the fourth race over a field of eight. Trailing until the field had hit the backstretch the second time around and after Speedwell Guy had led the field around, driver Harold Stead opened Buddy out wide at the three-quarters to take him to the front to stay. Down the stretch Bonnie Dale was coming very fast but she couldn't quite make the grade and a break fell from the wire ruined all possible chances.

Kelly's Nightmare, favored to take the above heat, got revenge in the second appearance of the same field in the tenth mile. Getting away on top the Nightmare gave a fine display. The daughter of Kalmuck never lifted her nose the entire mile; she took over the lead at the quarter pole from Buddy Budlong to hold on from there on. Bonnie Dale challenged from the seven-eighths pole to the wire but the Nightmare was just too good.

 It was anti-climax as Lucky Number came through to head the same field on their next appearance in the ninth race. That trip five horses raced under the wire so closely packed that a camera shot had to separate them.
