"Crimson City" Thrills Crowds At The Capitol

"The Crimson City" is a thrilling yet tender love story. It has to do with Nan Toy, slave in the "House of a Thousand Daggers," on the China coast, and with Gregory Kent, fugitive from justice.

Nan Toy, like another "Madame Butterfly," rescues Kent, nurses him to health, only to give him up at last, when his honesty has been proved and his white sweetheart has come from England to claim him.

This is but a bare outline of a story which is crammed with exciting action, brilliant coloring and breath-taking suspense. The sure direction of Mr. Mayo is evident in every crowded foot of the film.

Myrna Loy plays Oriental parts as no other white woman can, her exotic, languorous beauty of interpretation having given rise to the false rumor that she is herself Eurasian. Nan Toy is a part of such passionately pathetic appeal as to give her the best vehicle of her career.

The atmosphere of the piece is heightened by the presence of that great character actor, Sojin, and the bewitching Anna May Wong. Matthew Betz gives a brutally correct portrayal of the slave driver. Leila Hyams, always lovely, plays the part of the English girl and Anders Randolph is convincing as her father, the British army officer. Richard Tucker is effective as Bland the double-dyed deceiver. "The Crimson City" is a melodrama well worth your while, a vigorous story splendidly told.

The Car Owner's Scrap Book

Removing Tight Kingbolts
When a Kingbolt becomes tight in the axle so that it resists all ordinary methods of removal, the following methods may succeed. Remove the nut on the end of the bolt, and jack up the front end of the car with the lower end of the kingbolt resting on the head of the jack. Then, with a block of wood resting on the head of the axle, close to the kingbolt, strike it a sharp blow with a hammer. The weight of the car and the force of the blow will usually loosen the bolt.

NIGHT DRIVING IN TRAFFIC

When driving at night in heavy traffic where the cars are close together, it is both useless and wasteful to have the headlamps burning brightly. The farthest that can be seen is the car ahead, which can be seen equally as well with the cowl lights only. The glare reflected by the rear of the car ahead also tires the eyes. As the driving will usually be slow, the generators will not be turning over rapidly enough to furnish the same amount of current which the headlamps would use. This is one of the smaller points which give big returns in better battery service.

REPLACING THE CYLINDER HEAD GASKET

When a cylinder head gasket is replaced, the hole in the gasket must exactly line up with the screw holes in the cylinder block. Otherwise, when the head is replaced and the screws started, the gasket may be damaged in forcing the screws through. To prevent this, a special pair of studs which are used only for aligning the gasket may easily be made. Secure two cap screws of the correct size with an unthreaded portion under the head, cut off the head and slot with a hacksaw for a screwdriver. Insert the studs into holes in opposite ends of the cylinder block, drop the gasket over them, and then place the cylinder head over them. The balance of the screws may then be started without any danger of the gasket slipping. The special studs may then be removed and the regular screws inserted.

Testing Spark Plugs

Testing a spark plug by placing it on the cylinder head and turning over the motor to bring it to the firing point of that cylinder, is satisfied for determining if the plug is capable of producing a spark, but it must be remembered the spark may jump the gap at atmospheric pressure but not in the cylinder, due to the increase resistance of the compression pressure. A method sometimes practiced is to spread the points so that the current must jump a wider gap. This is a more definite test, but the spark plug points may be broken in the bending. A better way is to place a piece of insulating material, such as fiber, mica, or even an ordinary visiting card, between the points, so that the spark plug is compelled to jump around it.

USE A MIRROR

A small hand mirror does not necessarily belong only in millady's handbag; it has a place in the tool box also. Some road repairs are difficult to make owing to the absence of light and the fact that there may be no room for a lamp. A small mirror, reflecting the light from one of the headlamps will prove helpful in many cases.

CARE OF THE RIMS

When a casing freezes to the rim, it becomes quite difficult to remove even to the point of causing damage. To prevent this trouble, the casing should be kept out of actual metallic contact with the inside of the rim. This may be done by painting the inside of the rim with a mixture of shellac and graphite, the acting as a lubricant to prevent chafing. If the rim a rubber cover which may be done by cutting a band of the proper width from an old tube, cementing the ends together, and stretching it over the inside of the rim. If there is no old tube available, several layers of heavy wrapping paper, applied, with shellac, will serve the same purpose.

BRAKE ADJUSTMENT

Brake shoe should be adjusted with the smallest possible clearance, so that the full braking action will be secured, and still release immediately when the pedal pressure is released. If the clearance is affected by the load in the car, due allowance must be made.

DETECTING LEAKS
Leaks around the priming cups or spark plugs may be detected by applying a little oil around the threads; if there is a leak; bubbles will appear. If a leak is suspected at the intake manifold gasket, squirt a little gasoline around these points while the engine is running; if there is a leak, the engine will pick up speed. If the exhaust fumes enter the car and the manifold connection to the engine is suspected, pour a little oil into the priming cups, start the engine and open the priming cups to admit the oil into the cylinders. Then partly close the muffler opening and watch for smoke at the manifold connection.

KEEP THE BATTERY DRY

Water or electrolyte, spilled on the outside of the battery, may run to the metal parts of the frame, causing a short circuit by conducting the current to the frame.
