BOY KILLED AT CAPE TRAVERSE

(Special to the Guardian) CAPE TRAVERSE, Aug. 29.—Ryerson, Waddell, 14 years of age, was almost instantly killed here today. He was driving a cart in which was a saw and frame, and sitting on the latter. The cart wheel dropped into a rut, which caused the boy to lose his balance. In trying to save himself he grasped the saw which also overbalanced and fell on the unfortunate boy's head crushing it and causing almost instant death. Dr. Boyer was immediately summoned but the deceased was a quiet, unassuming boy and was highly thought of. He was a son of Mr. James Waddell, Kelly's Cross and had been for some weeks in the employ of his cousin, Mr. Augustus Waddell, Cape Traverse.

The remains will be laid to rest in the English Church Cemetery, Crapaud, probably Saturday.

FIVE KILLED MANY INJURED

PETERBORO, Ont., August 28.—A gloom has been cast over the city by one of the worst, if not the worst disaster in its history. With no more warning than a few ominous cracks that were immediately followed by a rendering of timber, and a crashing of bricks and mortar, a big section of the largest departmental store in Peterboro collapsed this morning, killing five persons, and injuring more or less seriously a dozen.

DEATH OF CAPTAIN SPAIN

TORONTO, Aug. 29.—Capt. G. V. Spain who was formerly Commander of the Canadian Fisheries Protection fleet died yesterday. He had been an imperial navy officer and received an Egyptian medal and the Khedive's bronze star.

(He was well known in Prince Edward Island having frequently called here in the cruiser Acadia.)

NOW HE IS CHIEF COMMISSIONER

(Canadian Press.) OTTAWA, Aug. 29.—Col. A. P. Sherwood, C.M.G., has been appointed Chief Commissioner of Dominion Police. Heretofore he had been styled Commissioner.

The new arrangement gives him authority over federal police wherever employed in Canada.

LARGEST SHIP SWEEP BY FIRE

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—The steamship Imperator, the largest vessel afloat, was swept by fire early today when she lay at her dock at Hoboken with her crew and 1,131 steerage passengers aboard.

Second officer Gobrecht, who led the crew in the fight with the flames was cut off from his men, enveloped in a cloud of smoke, and suffocated, his body was found an hour later, untouched by fire and brought ashore. A seaman, identity not yet determined, one of the party who went of the vessel, was missing at roll call. He undoubtedly perished, too.

MINUTES OF PRESBYTERY

At Ross Valley, and within the Presbyterian Church there, on Thursday August 28th, and at 2.30 p. m. Which time and place the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met and was constituted. Dr. T. F. Fullerton Moderator pro tempore, with whom were present Messrs McHattie, McNeill, and Sutherland, Ministers, and J. A. Lawson, D. Macdonald and T. C. James, Elders.

Mr. T. C. James was appointed Clerk pro tempore. The edict of induction of Mr. Alexander Ferguson having been returned as duly served it was again read by the Clerk to the assembled congregation, and no objections being offered, Mr. J. H. McHattie conducted Divine Service preaching from Job 7 verse 17. "What is man that Thou shouldst magnify him?"

Dr. Fullerton narrated the steps, after which the usual questions were put and being satisfactorily answered, the Moderator led in prayer, and solemnly inducted Mr. Alexander Ferguson into the pastoral charge of the congregation of St. Athababy, and gave him the right hand of fellowship. The newly inducted minister was welcomed by the members of Presbytery, and thereafter was suitably addressed by Mr. G. A. Sutherland on the duties and responsibilities to which he had been called. Dr. Fullerton reminded the people of their obligations to their minister and to the church at large. Mr. Ferguson was then welcomed by his congregation and introduced to the Session and their future Moderator, after which, on professing his willingness to sign the Formula, his name was ordered to be added to the Roll, and he took his seat as a member of the court.

The special committee appointed to examine Mr. Joseph S. Mackay reported—whereupon, it was moved by Dr. Fullerton, seconded by Mr. James, and unanimously agreed, as follows:

The Presbytery, considering that Mr. Joseph S. Mackay has now delivered the discourses prescribed to him as parts of his trials for license, and that he has passed through his catechetical trials (the other public trials being dispensed with, owing to the fact that the General Assembly has granted permission to take him on trials without any literary or theological curriculum) did, upon a conjoint review of the said appearance, sustain the same, and resolve to grant him license to preach the Gospel.

The questions prescribed by the General Assembly for Licensure were then put to Mr. Mackay, to all of which he gave satisfactory answers, and agreed to sign the Formula when called upon to do so.

Thereupon, after prayer by Mr. G. A. Sutherland, the Moderator, in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, the only King and Head of the Church, and by the authority of the Presbytery, did, and hereby does license the said Joseph S. Mackay to preach the Gospel within the bounds of this Presbytery, and wherever God, in His Providence, may order his lot.

A committee consisting of Dr. Fullerton, Messrs Sutherland, Miller, and McNeill was appointed to solicit aid for our Theological students pursuing their studies at Halifax.

Presbytery adjourned to meet at the call of the Moderator of Synod, of which public intimation was made and this sedentary closed with the Benediction.

LADIES' MARITIME GOLF TOURNAMENT

After four days of interesting and enjoyable sport, the annual tournament of the Ladies' Maritime Golf Association was brought to a close at the Belvedere Links, Charlottetown, yesterday afternoon, when better weather prevailed than had been the case on the two previous days.

The events that remained to be contested were the final of the First Consolation Match, in which Mrs. Bonnyman, of Amherst, and Mrs. Goodwill, of Charlottetown, were the competitors, and the team match for the Interprovincial Cup. In the Consolation Final Mrs. Bonnyman defeated Mrs. Goodwill. The Interprovincial match was between teams of 19 players a side, representing Nova Scotia, against New Brunswick and P. E. Island combined. The Nova Scotia team was captained by Miss Bauld, of Halifax, and the New Brunswick and P. E. Island team by Miss Smith, of St. John. After plenty of interesting play, the Nova Scotia team were declared the winners.

At five o'clock, when there was a large and fashionable gathering present, the finale was reached with the interesting ceremony of the presentation of the prizes. This was performed by Mr. W. K. Rogers, President of the Charlottetown Club.

SPEECH OF THE PRESIDENT.

Before making the presentation Mr. Rogers expressed the great pleasure it gave him to perform the duty. When they heard in Charlottetown that the annual tournament of the Ladies' Maritime Golf Association would be held here this year, it was with a great deal of pleasure that they welcomed the news. They were very glad to have such a fine lot of players come here from the other two provinces, and he might say that they have been fortunate in that way.

Speaking for the other members of the club, both ladies and gentlemen, he could assure them that among themselves he had heard nothing but expressions of great pleasure that they should have all those good players with them at this meeting. They had done what they could to make the time pleasant for the visitors while they were here. He was very glad the matches had been carried out so successfully and so pleasantly. From what he could hear there had never been a place where the annual tournament had been conducted with greater success than it was here. The players had all been good sports and the best feeling had existed. That has a great deal to do with the success of the play and he hoped that the players had all had a good time. They had very well favored indeed. They had had a little rain but he was glad to say that it had not interfered with any of the important matches. He could only express in what few words he might the warmest feelings of welcome for the visitors from all the members of the club, and their satisfaction that they had had a good time.

Mr. Rogers then handed over to the respective winners the prizes they had won.

In doing so he remarked, as regards the championship, that the competition for it had been very keen, and the competitors had all been good sports. The best player, of course, had won and he had great pleasure in presenting that trophy to Mrs. Handsomebody as the champion lady golfer of the Maritime Provinces. (Applause). He believed it was an honor she had borne once before. Therefore it would not be new to her. The best medal score in the tournament, which was made in the qualifying round of the championship, was made by Miss Bauld, who did the two rounds in 91. (Applause). The second best medal score was made by Mrs. Handsomebody—103. The driving competition was won by Miss Bauld, who in three drives made 449 yds.

In conclusion Mr. Rogers said that he could only express again the very great pleasure it had given all of them in Charlottetown to have the visitors with them. The presence of such a lot of fine players was a lesson to them. They had never been able to get many players here, and he hoped the tournament would be an example to the newer of their players of what successful players persistent effort and close attention to the game would develop.

THE VISITORS' DELIGHT.

Miss Murray, of Halifax, on behalf of the visiting players, proposed a hearty vote of thanks to the local officers of the Association for their arrangements, for the reception and entertainment of them, making special mention of the Vice-President, Mrs. Longworthy, and the Secretary, Miss Mary Bartlett. She expressed the pleasure it had been to her to visit the Island, to which it was her first trip, and she assured them that that pleasure was shared in by the other players. They were delighted with the very kind and warm manner of their reception and the successful way in which the tournament had been carried out. It had been a most enjoyable time for all of them. (Applause).

Miss Smith, of St. John, seconded the vote. This had been her first visit to the Island, too, and she had derived the utmost pleasure from it.

Lower Rates on Flour. TORONTO, Aug. 29.—The Dominion government is to be asked by the Dominion Miller's Association to subsidize a line for ocean freighters to carry Canadian flour to the British market at the same rates as those levied on the wheat cargoes. They declare that the freight rate of ten cents, hundred pounds in favor of wheat is a direct discrimination against them. An effort is also being made to establish a British-Canadian freight rate commission.

THE WEATHER THE TEMPERATURE TIDE, MOON ETC (Special to the Guardian) TORONTO, Aug. 30.—Moderate to fresh south to west winds, showers in most localities but partly fair with about the same temperature. The highest temperature recorded yesterday was 76 degrees above zero and the lowest was 63 above. The lowest the previous night was 60 above. At nine a.m. it was 50 and at nine p.m. 63 above.

There will be a new moon on Sunday, August 31st, at 4.38 p.m. The length of today will be thirteen hours and twenty-four minutes and of tomorrow thirteen hours and twenty-one minutes.

TWO BUILDINGS COLLAPSED

(Canadian press) Montreal, Aug. 29.—Building at 192 Peel St., three stories in height, collapsed tonight and fell to the sidewalk taking with it an office building adjoining. The accident occurred about 7.45 o'clock. It is practically certain that no one was in the vicinity at the time and not one person injured. Both buildings are a mass of ruins. The collapse is believed to be due to blasting operations in preparation for the Drummond building next door. The loss is estimated at \$25,000.

MISSIONARY KILLED BY CHINESE

(Special) SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 28. Catholic officials here tell of the death of the Rev. Father Francis Bernat, a Franciscan missionary, at the hands of Chinese fanatics in a remote region of North Shensi, on June 13.

The message said Father Bernat and a servant were travelling in shensi when they were attacked by members of the Chinese society of the Elder Brothers, a dreaded confederation of Chinese that has opposed the march of Christianity in the Orient. Both the priest and his servant were killed.

Father Bernat was a native of Barcelona, Spain. He entered on his missionary work in Shensi five years ago.

TWO DROWNED WHILE FISHING LUNENBURG, August 28.—The sad news reached here today from the fishing schooner W. C. McKay, of the loss of two of her crew, James Mossman of Leander, Lower Kingsburg, and Andrew Hirtle, youngest son of Nathan Hirtle, also of Kingsburg. A few days ago the vessel was at New Brunswick in quest of bait, and had gone out on the fishing grounds with a fresh baiting, and while overhauling their trawls these two men were drowned.

The body of Mossman was recovered and is on the way here for interment, and will be buried under the auspices of the Ancient Order of Foresters, to which both men belonged. Thaw being a prisoner of the provincial courts the statute is such that immigration officials are not able to intervene unless some new move or method is resorted to and it would appear that he will not be interfered with by the department so long as the present commitment holds good.
