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Amerks And Wings Play 2 - all Draw

DETROIT, Feb. 13—New York Americans and Detroit Red Wings struggled to a 2-2 overtime tie tonight in a National Hockey League game.

Seven thousand five hundred spectators saw Johnny Gallagher shoot the tying goal at 12:43 of the third period.

Only in the second period did the action speed up. Sweeney, a 3-3-triner set up an Amerk goal at 3:25 by passing to Lorne Carr who lifted a high shot into the net.

Carl Lacombe, Detroit rookie, tied the count a minute and a half later and Syd Howe sent the Red Wings into the lead at 14:59 of the period.

That ended the scoring until Gallagher came through with the equalizer.

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Freak Goal Accounts For Bruin Overtime Victory; Rangers Drub Maroons 4-1

BOSTON, Feb. 13—After more than 60 minutes of scoreless play, Boston Bruins scored a lucky goal in overtime tonight for a 1-0 victory over Montreal Canadiens in a National Hockey League game.

A break was resulted in a trick goal nullified Will Cude's brilliant goaltending early in the extra-session. The puck went into the goal net after glancing off Canadian defenceman Red Gouppille's skate from Leroy Goldsworthy's stick.

Canadiens played without Babe Siebert, powerful defenceman, and Walter Buwel was in action for about 50 of the 70 minutes of play.

Goalie had 30 difficult saves, about six of which could be rated as scoring shots.

Fifteen thousand persons saw the game.

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Black Hawks Hold Leafs To 1-1 Draw

CHICAGO, Feb. 13—Toronto's Maple Leafs and Chicago Black Hawks battled through an overtime period to a 1-1 tie tonight in their second National Hockey League battle in two nights—a presentation which included fistie entertainment.

Just before Paul Thompson lit a 35 foot shot past a much surprised goalie Turk Broda to put the Hawks ahead in the first period, two stalwarts from each team were given major penalties for battling. The fight started between Oully Dahlstrom, young Hawk wingman, and Murph Chamberlain of the Leafs, who staged a fair wrestling match. The affair quickly sprang, with defenceman Bill McKenzie of Chicago, and Reg Hamilton of Toronto, trading punches for almost a minute before the fourth goal.

The Leafs squared the count midway of the second period when Sylvanus Apps converted a short pass from Jimmy Fowler to beat Mike Karakas.

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Rangers Upset Maroons In Wide Open Game 5-3; Hawks Turn Back Leafs

MONTREAL, Feb. 13—(CP)—New York Rangers' classy combination of youth and experience gave Montreal Maroons' pay-off hopes another jolt last night with a 5-3 victory over the redskins in a wide-open National Hockey League game here.

Taking advantage of every Montreal miscue Rangers passed their way to an easy victory, climbed to within a point of the American division leading Bruins and left Maroons cellar-bound in the Canadian section.

Rangers gave the crowd of 6,500 an exhibition of their passing artistry a minute after the game began when Lynn Patrick opened the scoring after black-haired Cecil Dillon set up the play.

Frankie Botcher was still serving part of Coulter's penalty when Gus Marker scored Maroons' second goal on a mass attack with Herbie Cain and Bob Gracie. Des Smith was chased three minutes later however and Rangers came back with goals by Clint Smith and Bryan Hextall.

Gracie ended the scoring less than a minute after Smith returned with Cain and Marker drawing assists.

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Canada Still Undeclared In Title Play

PRAHA, Czechoslovakia, Feb. 13—With the first three days of play over, Canada was at the expense of Austria 1-0 Saturday in the world's amateur hockey championship.

Each has won two games in the first round without being seriously challenged. Canada's second victory today was at the expense of British Empire Games, greatest record-shattering meet since the games originated eight years ago.

A pair of South African hurdlers also opened the way for the final day of record lowering in the eight day competition that saw 21 of the 30 marks toppled.
