CAPT. CHRISTIAN HEESCHEN

Captain Christian Heesch, son of Denmark and well-known business man, died after a long illness Monday in Victoria General hospital. He was 84.

He was born in Copenhagen and early entered the Royal Danish Navy. He came to Canada on a New York bound ship, conditions on which were so bad he left the ship at that port and made his way to Halifax.

He obtained his master's papers from the old Halifax Navigation school at the corner of Bedford Row and Prince streets in 1881, and later sailed his ships to every corner of the world.

He had many exciting experiences including many narrow escapes from death or serious injury. In time he became a well-known sea captain of the Midford Pneumatic Company, a U. S. concern, but returned to Halifax with the Ordnance department and subsequently became Ordnance superintendent in Charlottetown, P. E. I.

The funeral was held Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock with Mass at St. Thomas Aquinas Church—Halifax Chronicle.

U. S. Navy Chief Comments On Air War

WASHINGTON, April 16 — (CP) — The chief of United States naval operations set forth today the view of the navy that German air power, "has not seriously affected British control of the sea lanes of the world."

Admiral Harold R. Stark, testifying before a Senate Committee today, said that the admiral's statement setting forth the navy's view on the relative importance of sea and air craft in time of war.

"Air power has not seriously affected British control of the sea lanes of the world," Stark said.

"It has, in a restricted area, comparatively close to its home base, become of increasing effect, against ships and shipping within range of these bases. After seven months of war, in which the immediate major decrease has been the reduction of the sea strength of Great Britain, relatively small damage has been done by air attack from German advances located 10 to 50 miles from the British Fleet bases.

"The principal menace and effect has been against commercial shipping in certain localized areas and ports. The proximity of British seaports to German air bases may result in continuing, and perhaps increasing, damage to this localized shipping unless the British counter-action becomes more effective."

RECORDS EARTHQUAKE

HALIFAX, April 16 — (CP) — The seismograph at Dalhousie University early today recorded a "fairly severe" earthquake the epicentre of which was an estimated 4,800 miles away.

Prof. O. L. Johnstone, seismologist, said the recording began at 2:19 a.m. AST, and continued for 1 1/2 hours.

Will Operate Flying School

OTTAWA, April 15 — (CP) — A company to be known as the Malton Flying School Limited, with the Toronto Flying Club as principal shareholder, will operate No. 1 elementary flying training school under the British Commonwealth air training plan at Malton airport, Toronto, was announced tonight.

Representatives of the Canadian Flying Clubs Association, with which are affiliated 23 amateur flying clubs throughout Canada have been negotiating with the national defence department for some months to establish what part they could play in the ambitious air training plan.

Royal Canadian Air Force officials also announced tonight that a company to be known as Dominion Skyways (Training) Limited, with Dominion Skyways Limited as principal shareholder, will operate No. 1 air observers' school at Malton airport, and indicated that other long-established commercial aviation companies might operate similar observers' schools under the British Commonwealth air training plan.

NEW YORK, April 17 — Stocks Allied to war override bearish opposition today to reach advanced positions at the end of a gyrating market session.

Rush of buying orders sent leaders as much as two points up in the first hour. On the Canadian list small gains were shown by Distillers Seagram, Ford and Lake Shore. International Nickel, Brazilian, Imperial Oil and Shawinigan dipped trifles.

The net result was that the Associated Press average of 50 selected stocks was unchanged at 50.1. A total of 902,010 shares changed hands compared with 1,305,880 yesterday.

One of the oddities of the session was the ragged performance of aircrafts. Most ended higher but eastern air lines and American Airlines dropped more than two points each.

Among the best performers on the upside were Bethlehem, Youngstown, Yellow Truck, Douglas, Glenn Martin, Lockheed, Dow Chemical, Allied Chemical, American Can, Phelps Dodge, Anaconda, Kennecott, Southern Railway, New York Shipbuilding, Pullman Mines, Union Bag & Paper and International Paper. The last three attained year's peaks.
