Rumania's Debt To U. S. Is \$50,000,000

PARIS, Sept. 8.—Rumania will send a mission to the United States to settle the debt question the Rumanian Finance Minister, Vintila Bratianu, informed the Temps today. The mission will leave about the end of this month. "But," he added, "for Rumania the funding of the American debt implies settling her other debts also, for our debt to the United States, about \$50,000,000 including interest, is far less important than our debts to our great European allies."

MONARCHY WILL ENDURE SAYS LORD BUCKMASTER

LONDON, Ont., Sept. 5.—No matter who rules in England the monarchy is safe, according to Lord Buckmaster, former Lord Chancellor of Great Britain, who paid a brief visit here yesterday. "Those in England who advocate the abolition of the monarchy and the substitution of republican institutions constitute such an infinitesimally small portion of the whole as to be negligible," he declared. Lord Buckmaster expressed the view that if the Baldwin administration should fall in the next election it will be followed by either a Labor government or a coalition of Liberals and moderate Laborites.

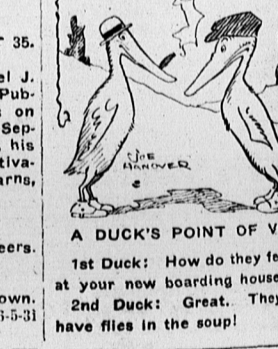
