Yankees Blast Three Homers In Inning

NEW YORK, June 20—(AP)—The New York Yankees tied a major league record they share with several other clubs today as they blasted out three home runs in one inning and went on to beat the Browns 8-4 in St. Louis. They thus moved back into second place, behind the Indians.

The three Yankee homers came in the sixth, all of them off Les Tietje, and were good for five runs. Lou Gehrig hit his 10th of the year after Joe DiMaggio had opened the inning with a triple. Joe Gordon ran out a four-bagger and scored Tommy Henrich ahead of him, and Spud Chandler lifted another into the left field sun seas.

Retain Second Place

NEW YORK, June 20—(AP)—Scoring two runs off Johnny Lanning in the 13th inning, Cincinnati Reds today moved out the Bees 3-1 in Boston to retain their slim second-place margin over Chicago Cubs.

With one out and Wally Berger on first in the Reds' half of the final frame, Ival Goodman batted a triple to right center to score Berger with the deciding run. He scored himself a moment later on Frank McCormick's long fly.

In Brooklyn, behind the seventh-inning pitching of Bill Lee, who hung up his eighth victory of the season, Chicago pounded out 11 hits to whip the Dodgers 5-1.

The Cubs' attack included a home run by Ripper Collins with a man on base, which gave the Chicagoans their first two runs and a single double and triple by Phil Cavarretta.

Trend Swings To Louis As Fistic Faithful Flock To New York For Title Bout

NEW YORK, June 20—Sizzling in the high temperature of their own arguments, as well as the current June heat wave, the fistic faithful tonight gravitated toward the big town and the big fight.

The approach of the near \$1,000,000 spectacle this Wednesday evening in the Yankee Stadium, featuring dusky Joe Louis and teutonic Max Schmeling in a 15-round match for the world heavyweight boxing crown, seemed to be conducive to more fever than fact-finding.

Although the climax of training camp activity produced more startling than re-assuring that both gladiators had worked themselves into the traditional peak of condition, it developed week-end betting had made champion Louis a more pronounced favorite to turn the tables on his challenger.

Betting Odds

There has been little tendency to "go overboard," either financially or for literary effect, but Broadway Jack Doyle reported his latest wagering quotations as follows:

2 to 1 against Louis to win, 17 to 10 against Schmeling, on a decision; 9 to 10 against a knockout of Louis 5 to 2 against a repetition of his 1936 k.o. by Schmeling.

"Louis will become a strong favorite, if the present trend continues, and may be the 2 to 1 choice by Wednesday," Doyle added.

Barring sudden developments, there's little reason to doubt that Joe and Max will enter the ring as closely matched as any title pair since the Dempsey-Tunney days.

The usual 11-hour rumors have begun to develop along cauliflower

row—most of them designed to hint that "Louis can't lose"—but this is characteristic of the fight game, in its bigger business dealings. It can be discounted now, as heretofore.

"Inside Talk"

Behind some "inside talk" is the idea that Schmeling, if he repeats his victory of 1936 and becomes the first ex-champion to retain the crown, will put the championship "on ice" back home in Germany.

This, of course, would be a severe blow to the industry now dominated by Promoter Mike Jacobs. It doesn't hold very much weight, however.

It is no secret, however, that Jacobs will be much better pleased if Louis gets the revenge he is seeking and remains the king of the heavyweights. The negro is under long-term contract with "Uncle Mike" and is certain to defend the title again this year, if he turns back the German.

Louis, satisfied that he is on edge, tapered off today at Pompton Lakes, N.J., with roadwork and a motor trim of his career's last serious workout, with the gloves on, impressed a capacity gallery of fans and critics yesterday.

Schmeling, after a brick four-round drill in his Speculator, N.Y., camp today, echoed his handlers' assertion that he is in the best fighting trim of his career.

Max: "I'm satisfied that I've reached unsurpassed condition. I expect to win over Louis again."

Indians Play All Stars Win Bees Tonight Midget Game

With the arrival in the city last night of Ray McIntyre and his manager Earl Nelson the stage was all set for the biggest boxing card ever attempted in an Island ring. Thursday night headlined as it is by the meeting between "Irish" Leo Kelly and McIntyre, undisputed middleweight champion of the Dominion.

McIntyre, looking to be in A-1 condition and confident of beating the up-and-coming boy had very little to say upon arrival but this much was gleaned from him and that is that he will fight at top speed all the way; the quicker the fight ends the better he will like it—if it goes his way—and as the brief interview ended his manager stated that McIntyre would complete his training grind at the Forum the next two afternoons.

And all that Kelly goes about completing his training, a serious young fighter if ever there was one. Knowing full well that his future depends upon his showing Thursday night Leo right at the moment is in his finest condition. His backers, scared to let him get too fine, are going to make him take it easier from now on and it is their main idea that Kelly will enter the ring Thursday night in the finest condition of his career.

So much for the main bout. Shunted back out of the limelight somewhat by the semi-final that is really and will be a second main bout, Dannie McCormack, like Kelly is making a bid for ring recognition by taking the dusky-colored lad Cecil Braithwaite from Toronto, former amateur champion of the Dominion and the present holder of the Quebec middleweight championship.

McCormack, recent victor over Porter McIntyre of Saint John's bout at Souris, will not arrive in the city until the day of the fight, but in the meantime he has been busy in store for him. There isn't a bit of quit in him and if Braithwaite should prove too good — we are not predicting that — fans can rest assured that McCormack won't be beaten until he has given of every ounce of ability in his well-conditioned body.

Yesterday we glimpsed Braithwaite in action in a workout at the Forum. One could not help but be impressed by him. Smooth-flowing muscles over a wonderfully well-conditioned body gives the dusky Toronto lad the appearance of a panther inside the squared circle. Continually on top of his opponent Braithwaite pummeled two sparring partners savagely and although the majority of his punches were pulled one could tell that behind them there was loads and loads of sting.

Past as lightning he keeps up a continual tattoo on an opponent's body with what is the fastest left jab it has been this writer's privilege ever to witness. Suddenly that dynamite-laden right will shoot across and although yesterday it was being pulled this writer for one would like to see what would happen should it connect in a scheduled fight.

After working the equivalent of ten rounds, taking in shadow boxing, ring work, and punching the bag, Braithwaite was hardly drawing a fast breath so well is he conditioned. Keeping always in shape he fights for all that is in him on every appearance and promises that on Thursday night he will do the same thing.

Summing this scrap up it appears as if it will be a battle of lightning jabs from the port side and although Braithwaite's seems to be the fastest now it will be interesting to see what will happen once the pair tangle. But whatever way you take it fans are in for a real scrap here also. Those who saw Braithwaite go through his paces think he will prove too shifty and smart for McCormack, but don't forget the fact that many times in the past Dannie McCormack has come through with his best performances when the odds seemed stacked against him.

Interest seems dying down in local softball circles these days. Last night's game saw a very sparse attendance. And it seems to me to be the fault of the players engaged. The softball being played is on a par with other years and sometimes much better but when players do not take enough interest to get there in time then how on earth can they expect fans to sit patiently and wait for a half hour or more for games to get underway.

This state of affairs has been going on all season and it is the one sure way of killing the game. Last season the game appeared as if it would go over real big but then the players were making an effort to get there on time. There was no running around at the last minute to complete their lineups and as a result fans became interested.

Now the league is young yet and there is plenty of time to correct this un-called-for fault. If the players have the interest of the game at heart they will buckle up in future and make it a point to be there at starting time. If they don't, then the best thing they can do is forget about the game altogether.

This is not hinting at any one; they are all at fault. Perhaps if the umpires laid down an ultimatum and said either be here on time or else forfeit the game it would make the teams hustle a whole lot more than they have been wont to do since the league opened.
