ALBANY NEW SCHOOL

Recently it was the privilege of a Guardian Scribe to be shown through the new school building recently erected in Albany Village. This courtesy was intended through the kindness of Mr. Joseph Noonan, whose fame needs no introduction to Guardian readers. The building is a one-room institution, dimensioned 25 feet x 37 feet and 11 foot walk. Two cloak rooms and an entry are located on the west side, the seats face north thus permitting the light to fall upon the pupils' work from the back.

Lighting is admitted through fourteen green windows, each containing eight lights that measure ten by fourteen.

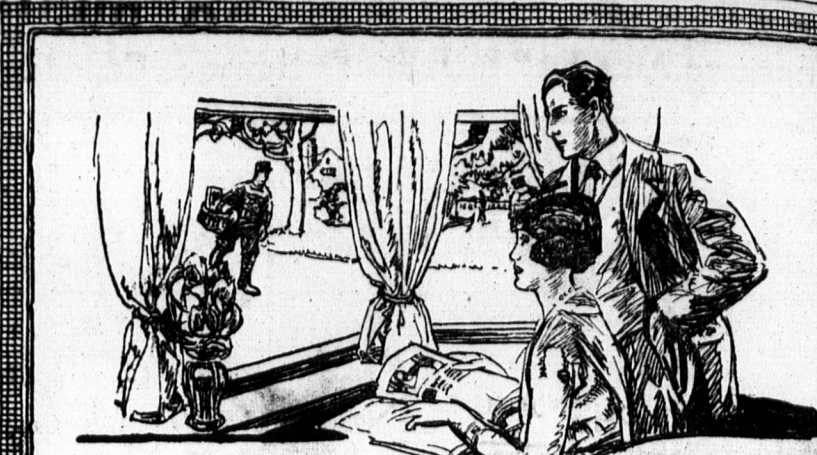
Ventilation is effected through the ceiling. All the inside finish is done in British Columbia Fir.

Seating is furnished by thirty individual desks, made of the choicest hardwood and finished in the most approved style.

The front wall supports a blackboard the full width of the room and rising six feet from the floor. A basement, 35 feet x 25 feet and 6 feet deep is rendered immune against water by concrete floor and walls and lighted by four spacious windows. Herein will be installed a furnace, and will also be stored the fuel.

The whole effect is designed to serve the most practical ends, and to meet all the requirements of modern educational advantages. This is only the culmination of the practical efforts of the people of Albany. A beautiful oak desk is installed upon a platform at the front of the class room, and a comfortable reversing chair is nicely appointed for the teacher.
