The accompanying instrumental was the organ which with the fiddle kept up with a few exceptions a continuous flow of pleasant music capable of uplifting the dullest spirit till a late hour. T. Crograve, Auctioneer, then announced that with every satisfaction feeling could soon be forgotten by giving hearing to the sale by auction of the numerous baskets mentioned above. The Auctioneer with a flow of language capable of taking the attention of the whole audience, sold each basket at a reasonable figure. The highest bidder on the dearest basket was Mr. Adrien Arsenault of Ezmont Bay, student-at-law with Mr. A. C. Saunders, Summerside, who in his love for the little Belgian race in need paid generously the sum of \$11.25. After lunch was served and the baskets emptied the dance was resumed with increased joy and satisfaction to all. At a late hour the audience resolved to put an end to an enjoyment which was so well partaken of by those present and everybody went home satisfied at the good behaviour of all without exception. But the pleasure of the good time experienced was only a trifle compared with the generous feelings of all present towards the suffering and brave little Belgians for which ample proof was given by the realization of the surprising sum of one hundred and twenty dollars, net proceeds.—R.

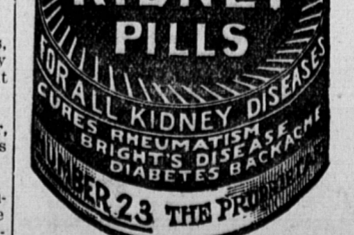
