## WINDSOR, CANNING AND WOLFFVILLE RESIGN FROM HOCKEY CIRCUIT

### Windsor Ready to Carry on But Fail to Get Financial Support—Stormy Gathering

WOLFFVILLE, Nov. 27. — With the resignations of Windsor, Wolfville and Canning hockey clubs from the Valley Hockey League, an organization which has flourished during the past four years, amid protests and a good brand of hockey, the league almost but not quite came to an untimely ending this evening.

In fact it was the general opinion of the representatives of the resigning clubs that their withdrawal meant the blow-up of the league for this year, but P. A. Margeson, manager of the Kentville Carl Angus, of the same town. This team, soon corrected impression when he stated that Kentville was still in the organization.

President Clifford Bowby, of Canning, presided and a full quota of delegates, with some additional, were present from all clubs as follows:

Windsor—W. Ryan, Frank Poole and Vic McCann.  
Wolfville—Cecil Hantsford, Carl Angus and J. W. Williams.  
Kentville—W. J. Gaspar, P. A. Margeson and S. Smith.  
Canning—C. Bowby, Harry Hoyt and Harry Lyons.

Following the reading of the Secretary's report, which showed a slight balance, Mr. Williams read three typewritten copies from the withdrawing clubs, which said that at meetings held in these towns it had been decided not to enter teams in league this year, and asked that the resignations be accepted.

In regard to the resignations, Mr. Hoyt, of Windsor, said that the notice of last week's meeting had gone astray and the first they knew of the session was when they read about it in the Morning Chronicle.

Since that time the Valley Hockey League had been the big topic of conversation in Windsor. A meeting had been held and their decision had been stated in a resolution. The main reason was that there was no one to back the club financially. In an endeavour to save the situation, Mr. Ryan had interviewed thirty citizens of Windsor today about entering a team in the League, and they refused to do so, but stated they would strongly support a Town League.

Frank Poole, star Windsor hockeyist, said the boys were willing and anxious to play but could do so without good backing.

Mr. Hantsford, of Wolfville, said there was no sense in Wolfville entering a team in the same league with Kentville.

"We are willing," he said, "to play with a team in our class, but Kentville is not in the same class as regards to hockey."

Mr. Gaspar, Kentville, regretted the resignations and pointed out that a team on paper did not always prove to be a world beater.

After some further discussion a motion that the resignations be accepted was moved by Cecil Hantsford, Wolfville, and seconded by Carl Angus, of the same town. This motion was carried, with Kentville delegates not voting.

President Bowby then suggested that a motion to adjourn was in order. Mr. Margeson objected on the grounds that Kentville were the sole representatives of the league present, and that the other delegates had no power. He asked that the books of the league be turned over to Kentville, as there was a possibility of other clubs entering and a meeting would be held in the near future. Mr. Ryan suggested that the present officers retain the records. The Kentville manager replied that they had no power to do this.

In fact Kentville was the only club in the League to have any say about League officers. After further discussion, which was quite stormy at times, it was moved by J. W. Williams, and seconded by P. A. Margeson, that Mr. Gaspar be elected President, and the books be turned over and trusted to him.

This carried and the meeting adjourned.

The resolution of the three clubs place the future of the Valley League in a very precarious position, it was felt inasmuch as Kentville have a very large contingent in the League. Therefore it is practically up to Kentville to say who would be in the League. Kentville players have entered the League with a chance of winning, and with a very poor team in 1923 and '25 they helped keep the league going.

The position of the Windsor club is generally understood in Kentville. With a strong team every year they have somehow failed to receive the support to which they have been entitled. This season they have lost McEsher, Sam and "Chook" McDonald and Gertridge, but other players were willing to carry on.

Windsor's coming to the meeting is greatly appreciated by Kentville. Mr. Margeson let it be known at the meeting.

### Bearcats Will Have Fast Team

Hopper, Kuhn, Smith and Murdoch Are Missing — Promising Material

TRURO, Nov. 27. — From all indications the Truro "Bearcats" will again be serious contenders for the 1926-27 Maritime Hockey title. While only four members of the regular squad of last year are available this season, Sammy Murdoch will likely be seen this winter in a Kentville uniform as he is now residing in the Valley town, where he is taking a dentistry course, while Newt Hopper and Gordon Kuhn are now located in Brantford, Ontario, and expect to play hockey this winter, according to a statement made by Hopper to W. A. Flemming while on a trip to the Royal Winter Fair last week. Alvin Smith is also among the missing, now being in Toronto.

Mr. Flemming, who was manager for the Bearcats last winter, said tonight that probably the team would be made up by the addition of some of the most promising players of last winter. Hockey has had a wonderful attraction for Truro people in late years, due to the remarkable record of the town and team, which won the Maritime championship twice, and last winter made two triumphant trips to the

The proud figure of the great black trotter has become the sensation of the show. Four ribbons had come to him early in the week and last night he won the outpour on admiration of the judges and first place in the \$1,000 roadster stake, defeating the highly rated mare, Jane Basset.

Bought by his present owner, George J. Peak, at an Old Glory sale for \$500, St. Mesrob has won 122 blue ribbons and championship rosettes in five years of the track. A high price of \$15,000 has been offered for him but Peak says he is not for sale.

## FORMER GOLF PRO. AT SYDNEY PAIRS WITH HAGEN IN MATCH

HALIFAX, Nov. 27. — Nat Cornfoot, for a few weeks last summer, for several years golf pro. at pro at the Ashburn Golf Club, is to play in a special match with Walter Hagen, the world's premier golfer, at the new Langara course of the C. P. R., at Vancouver.

Cornfoot and Hagen will be paired together against Young McFadden, the youthful Pacific Coast golf star and Roy Harn, professional, in charge of the Hastings Park Public course at Vancouver. The match will be staged on Thursday, December 2nd, and Hagen will attempt to lower the Langara course record which now stands at 70, this score having been made by Dave Aytou.

### NAT EFFICIENT PRO

Nat Cornfoot is a brother of Thomas Cornfoot, the present professional at Ashburn. Back four or five years ago Nat came to Sydney from Old St. Andrews, where his family resided, and where the two brothers learned their golf. The Cornfoot boys are natives of that historic golfing center, their home overlooking the famous old course, and they are both efficient and capable golf pros. Nat remained as pro with the Lingan club for several seasons, and then went to the United States two years ago. When Tom Cornfoot was taken ill last winter and was unable to carry on his duties at Ashburn early in the last season, Nat came to Halifax for several weeks. He left here to accept the job as pro at the new C. P. R. station in South Vancouver. He has been most successful in his work there. Few golf pros to come to the Maritimes were better teachers than Nat Cornfoot, while he is also an expert player, although somewhat handicapped as a result of a wounded wrist and arm, sustained during his service with an Imperial Regiment in the Great War. Golf enthusiasts in this province watch with keen interest the forthcoming match with Nat Cornfoot and Walter Hagen as partners.
