SOUTHAMPTON AND LONDON

Both Wrapped in Impenetrable Darkness

Dense Fog Delays Shipping, Stops Railway Trains, Closes Shops—Palace Darkened—Two Inventors Dead.

LONDON WRAPPED IN FOG. LONDON, Dec. 5.—(Special)—A dense fog caused delay to the shipping in Southampton waters.

Steamers are unable either to enter or leave port. Locomotion is most difficult and there were a number of casualties through collisions in the streets.

DARKNESS IN THE PALACE. Buckingham Palace and the whole district of Pimlico were plunged in darkness.

The electric lights failing, many shops had to close. The authorities started flare lights in the streets adding to the weirdness of the general gloom.

TRAINS COULD NOT RUN. Trains were much delayed and outside work had to be stopped in many places.

BAPTIST CHURCH AT GEORGETOWN

Was Opened Yesterday Very Auspiciously

Eloquent Sermon Preached in the Morning by Rev. G. R. White of Charlottetown—Other Services.

The Baptist Church at Georgetown was opened auspiciously yesterday with large audiences and a bright future is looked forward to by this small, but persevering congregation.

At the morning service the edifice was filled. The opening sermon was preached by Rev. G. R. White, pastor of the Baptist Church, Charlottetown.

He took for his text: 1 Cor. 3. 11. "The Sure Foundation." The speaker referred to the importance of foundation work which cannot be over-estimated. The master workman looks well to the foundation. Paul was a master workman in founding churches.

The preacher divided his subject into three heads.

1.—The impossibility of man laying sufficient foundation, on which to build.

2.—What are some of the false foundations.

3.—What then is the true foundation. In closing he said:—"We should seek to do work such as shall not only abide but form a strong foundation on which the progress of future ages may be built; for progress is the language of creation and revelation. The anthems of the universe sound it forth; the stars sing it; the winds whisper it; life speaks it; death preaches it; the words of God declare it true: Thus saith the Lord of Hosts, the latter glory shall be greater than the former. Then let us be wise and select as material for building on the true foundation, Jesus Christ that which outlasts the wreck of worlds. Choose ye the goal of a sound faith in Jesus, the silver of a consecrated life to Christ, the precious stones of a loving obedience to the will of God; for these shall abide when the stars shall fall.

A credit to the town and district, a monument to the enterprise and faith of the Baptists, stands their recently erected church.

Centrally located, midway between the two divisions of the town and in close proximity to the historic looking Court House; it is a structure the town may well feel proud of. The building is not yet quite completed; but the total cost including furnishings will be in the neighborhood of \$3,000. The pews, which were purchased in Amherst, are circular, giving a seating capacity of about 275. The edifice is 80 feet long and including the tower, which is of very pretty design, has a frontage of 40 feet on Kent Street. The windows are all of stained glass and are very handsome. The painting which is the work of Messrs O'Brien and Macdonald, is in every respect worthy of this popular firm. To James Manual more than any other individual member of the congregation is due a large share of credit. His untiring efforts are in a large measure accountable for the successful erection of the church. Altogether the pastor, Rev. F. D. Davidson, and people are to be congratulated on their splendid effort.

STEAD'S BIG NEWSPAPER SCHEME

Will Start A New Daily Paper With All Sorts of Modern Appendages.

NEW YORK, December 3.—A despatch to the Herald from London says: "W. T. Stead will start a new paper here, probably under the title of 'The Daily Paper.' He proposes to get 200,000 subscribers in London and deliver the papers at each door between ten and twelve o'clock in the morning, after the men have gone to business and when the women and children will have an opportunity to read it. It will cost a penny. Of his plan he says: 'The messengers, who will be bright young girls, will be instructed to collect from each subscriber letter complaints or advertisements in envelopes addressed to the editor, and in this way I hope to get in personal touch with all my readers. Depots will be established at various points in the city, at each of which I expect to have a Post Restants which sort of thing does not exist in London now, a free telephone, circulating library, reading room or place of call, and I hope an automatic restaurant.'

KILLED BY SAVAGES OF FORMOSA

The Arrival of The Survivors Of the Ship Benjamin A Sewell.

VICTORIA, B. C., Dec. 3.—The str. Iro Maru, which arrived today from the Orient, brought Captain and Mrs. Hoestadt, of the wrecked American ship Benjamin A. Sewall. Capt. What disposition was made of their bodies it was impossible to learn.

Since the wreck the United States consul at Shanghai has received advices from the United States that third mate Joseph Morris, one of the prisoners thought to have been murdered, had been left heir to \$38,000.
