Select Committee To Study Best Methods To Amend B.N.A. Act

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Feb. 12.—A select committee of nine members of the House of Commons will study and report on the best methods by which the British North America Act may be amended, in accordance with a resolution moved on Jan. 28 last by James S. Woodsworth (Lab. Winnipeg North Centre). Minister of Justice Hugh Guthrie tonight put through a motion naming the following members:

Minister of Justice Hugh Guthrie, F. W. Turnbull (Cons. Regina); D. J. Cowan (Cons. Port Arthur); W. G. Ernst (Cons. Queens-Lunen-burg); Onesime Gagnon (Cons. Dorchester); Hon. Ernest Lapointe (Lab. Quebec); and Hon. Ian MacKenzie (Lab. Vancouver Centre); Hon. J. L. Lalston (Lib. Yarmouth-Sheburne); and James S. Woodsworth (Lab. Winnipeg North Centre).

Mr. Woodsworth's resolution was accepted by the government with little debate and by Mr. Lapointe who spoke for the Liberal opposition who made the reservation that he would have the provinces party to any discussions on the subject of constitutional amendments. The resolution was as follows: "That in the opinion of this House a special committee should be set up to study and report on the best method by which the British North America Act may be amended so that while safeguarding the existing rights of racial and religious minorities, an legitimate provincial claims to autonomy, the Dominion Government may be given adequate power to deal effectively with urgent economic problems which are essentially national in scope."

Mr. Guthrie, speaking in the debate, said he believed it was time to ascertain whether the government could arrive at some agree-

HIGH SCHOOL TO BE NAMED ACADEMY

A resolution favoring the name, the Summerside Academy, now that grades 11 and 12 are taught in Summerside High School, was passed at last night's meeting of the School Board, presided over by chairman Dr. E. T. Tanton.

The resolution will be forwarded to the Department of Education for approval. This school up till two years ago had grades up to ten and for further instruction pupils went to Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown. Now pupils can enter universities outside the Province for they take Maritime common examining board examinations.

The principal of upper grades, Miss G. L. Maclean, reported that five graduates now at King's College, Mount Allison University, and Royal Military College had made excellent progress at respective universities. Roderick Smith at Kings, Halifax, led other students in physics and mathematics at the Christmas exams.

It is understood that the work of the committee named tonight will have no bearing upon the progress of social and economic legislation now before the House, in view of the stand of the government that it has already found constitutional authority under section 132 of the British North America Act to carry out treaty obligations regardless of provincial jurisdiction.

An invitation to the provincial members sent out last Aug. 31, by Sir A. B. Bennett, calling on them to attend a conference on the best methods of amending the British North America Act, and suggesting tentative changes that might be considered, failed to bring results. No suitable date could be agreed upon among the provincial premiers.

Representatives of the provincial governments will be expected to take a prominent part in the deliberations of the committee. The provinces will be invited to participate in the discussions, according to the trend of the debate when the Woodsworth motion was before the House.
