Sir,—Your correspondent "Bel-fast" is widely mistaken in his statement that the Government road machines are passing away in forgetfulness and leaving "no monument" to perpetuate their memory. It would be an assuring message of comfort to every auto owner or occupant if he could only prove that it was so.

On the contrary the country is overpaved with monuments, so liberally and conscientiously scattered around as to make a menace to life and limb, and located in places which the ordinary driver, not equipped with aeroplane attachments, can not hope to escape.

The "Hump-back" roads are not merely "Monuments" but menacing perpetrators which make more than a lasting impression. The ordinary monument will please the eye and tickle the fancy for the passing moment, and, unless it marks some great person or event is soon forgotten. But the auto rider, or the great mass of them, who are more or less nervous or timid, having once had the experience of traveling on a 65 degree angle on the side of any of those continuous "Hump-back" monuments, not knowing the moment at which they are liable to be hurled into eternity, will have an impression which can never be effaced from his or her memory.

Cleaning Painted Walls

Use two pails of lukewarm water when washing painted walls. Wet a cloth and sprinkle a little baking soda on it. Wash, then rinse with clear water and wipe dry.

Canadian Women's War Memorial Building

Rev. G. S. Buckingham of Ottawa, is spending a week in the City in connection with the proposed National Memorial Building to the Women of Canada to be erected in Ottawa, the site having been set aside by an order-in-council on Dec. 21st 1925. The building, plans of which have already been submitted, with cost amounting to \$250,000 which amount is to be raised by the women

of Canada, as the building is to be a National Memorial to the women of Canada East and West who have suffered in any way through the Great War and is to be a convention Centre for the Women of Canada in an endeavor to unify French, English Catholics, Jews and Protestants as only a general meeting place can.

The project should have a broad appeal to all women primarily because of its Memorial aspect and its worthy ideal of preserving and centralising tangible tributes to its history—making achievements of Canadian womanhood.

It is intended that building shall contain an auditorium capable of seating 2,000 people, a banquet hall, secretarial offices for National organizations of women, an archives and museum, a historical section and Hall of Fame. It will be large enough for any National women's convention held in Ottawa, and be a central bureau for the distribution of literature.

The building which is to be maintained by the women will be heated and lighted by the Government and will be free from taxation.

General organization is now being proceeded with to raise funds and an effort will be made to secure the endorsement of all nationally organized groups of Canadian women, and it is in this organization that Mr. Buckingham is interested.

Already the following organizations in Ottawa have endorsed the project.—The Hadassah, the Catholic Women's League, Women's Art Association, Federation of French Canadian women, the National Federation of St. Jean Baptists, The Kings Daughters, The National Easter Star, Women's Association of Ontario, Women's Institutes of Canada.

The Patronesses include representative ladies from all parts of Canada, including the families of Mrs. Nichols, Victoria, Miss Newlands, Government House, Regina, Mrs. Frank McKenna, Government House, Quebec; Mrs. W. F. Todd, Government House, St. Stephen, N. B. Mrs. James Terry, Government House, Halifax; Mrs. Howard, Ferguson, Toronto; Mrs. E. N. Rhodes, Halifax; Lady Shaughnessy, Montreal; Mrs. Edith Rogers, M. L. A., Vancouver; Mrs. Arthur Meighan, Ottawa; Lady Gouin, Ottawa, Judge Margaret Patterson, Toronto, and many others.

Private citizens or leaders of Societies interested in the project should get in touch with Mr. Buckingham who is stopping at the Strathearn Hotel, and who will very quickly explain the necessary steps to be given to help in the erection of the Women's Memorial.
