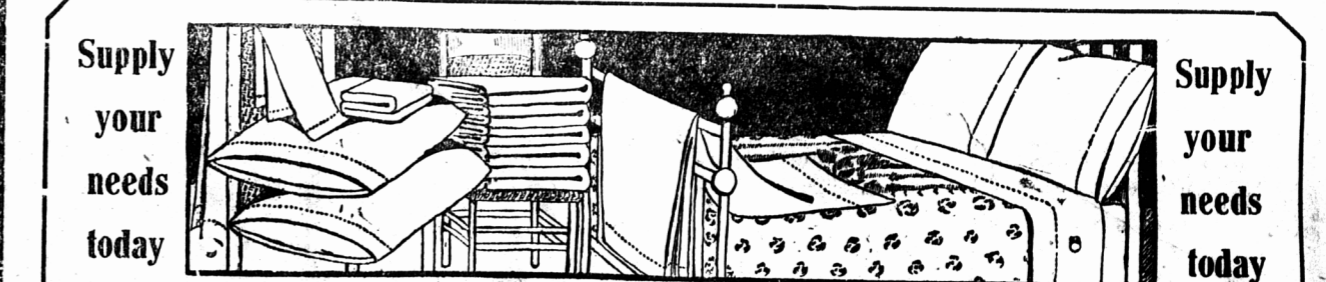

(Continued from page 1.) nancial and business districts. Not abating one whit in its fury the storm passed over the Canadian Pacific Railway, taking in its course half a dozen elevators, one of which fell plumb across the main line tracks, tying up traffic, which was however, later diverted.

Altho the full fury of the storm was most apparent in the central swath between Hamilton and Albert streets, a good deal of damage was done outside, particularly in the western railway yards.

At this hour details of losses, with names of killed and injured are not obtainable. REGINA, Sask., June 30—Estimated killed by cyclone at present twenty with hundreds injured. Damage will total millions; three churches destroyed and other public buildings.

SASKATOON, Sask., June 30—J. F. Cairns' department store is on fire and there is no hope of saving the building. The loss will be over half a million. Other stores in the vicinity may go.

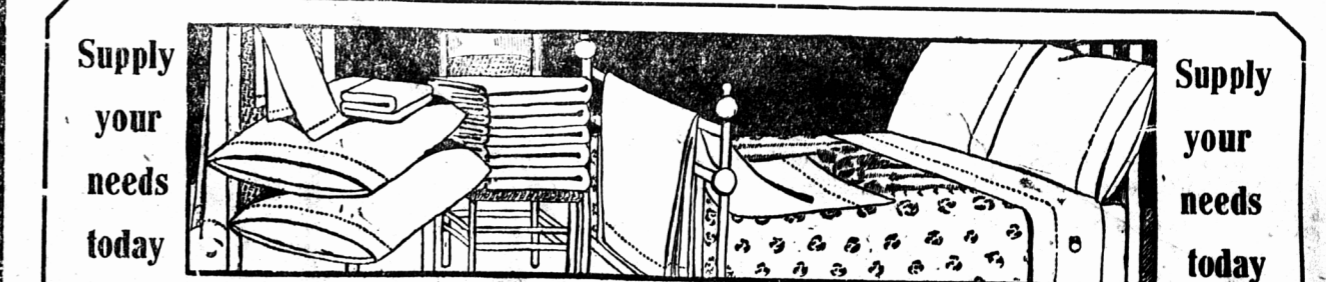
