UNSATISFACTORY

Elsewhere in today's issue appears a statement by Mr. E. W. MacKinnon, Division Superintendent of the C. N. R. here, with regard to the complaints about the proposed new train service.

Credit is undoubtedly due the management for the improvement which the new time table will effect in the service between Tignish and Charlottetown.

Unfortunately, the same accommodation cannot be made in the proposed changes east and south. The point that Mr. MacKinnon loses sight of is that intending purchasers from these sections are prejudiced by the new arrangement.

Mr. MacKinnon is no doubt justified in his statement that the jitney service between Summerside and Charlottetown was not sufficiently patronized in the past.

If no better arrangement can be made with the existing train service, it might be found practicable and remunerative to try the effect of a jitney service east and south, leaving the freight service for freight trains only.

A WORTHY CAUSE

The annual meeting of the Free Dispensary takes place at 4 o'clock this afternoon in the City Hall, and arrangements have been made for the annual collection for funds for this worthy institution on May 1.

A POLITICAL STORM

Smarting still under the effect of the Beauharnois exposure, which, in the words of the Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, left the Liberal party "in the Valley of Humiliation," Liberal politicians and press have been active recently in attacking Hon. George Henry, Premier of Ontario, and Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, government leader in the Senate, for holding \$25,000 and \$3,000 respectively of Ontario Power Service Corporation bonds.

NOTES BY THE WAY

President Roosevelt has ordered a cut in War Department expenses of \$144,000,000 for next year and the regular army personnel of 117,000 is to be reduced by some 17,000 of all ranks.

Chicago teachers are to receive \$1,700,000 as part of their unpaid salaries. This will leave a paltry \$28,500,000 to come—some time.

Delegates have met without accurate information. They have not known what the others wanted or scarcely what they were to ask or to concede themselves.

The irrepressible Huey Long, now United States Senator from Louisiana, professes to see great danger to United States ports in the proposed St. Lawrence waterways development.

The Black Shirts are said to be increasing in England under the leadership of Oswald Mosley. The item conveying this news gave no figures to substantiate the claim.

Norman F. Priestly, who is vice-president of the United Farmers of Alberta and one of the Western leaders of the new G.C.F. party, frankly told a gathering of farmers at Drumheller, Alta., says the London Free Press, that if the party won in Alberta it would be necessary to secede from Confederation to carry out the party principles.

The statement of President J. H. Lithgow of the Canadian Life Insurance Officers Association that Canadians collectively hold \$6,500,000,000 of life insurance is of tremendous significance.

Much of President Roosevelt's success in the first six weeks of his administration has been due to his understanding of politics. He has had hardly a rebuff, and it is said that he plans further drastic recommendations to Congress before permitting his first great drive to slow down.

HEALTH KNOWLEDGE NOW HANDED DOWN FROM PARENT TO CHILD

It is not unusual for school teachers to teach children, see them grow to manhood and womanhood and after the lapse of a few years have the children of these former pupils attend their classes.

Now just as certain subjects—reading, writing, spelling and arithmetic—get driven into the minds of the children, so for the past twenty-five years health subjects such as care of the teeth, cleanliness, and physical examinations have become everyday subjects to the children.

Sir George Newman, chief medical officer of the board of education, London, states that in spite of industrial depression and the need for national economy, no measurable ill effect is yet shown in the child population.

The percentage of children suffering from definite defects (except defects of the teeth and cleanliness) was only 20, of which 9 per cent were due to eye defects and 6 per cent to adenoids and enlarged tonsils.

Dr. Newman finds that a new kind of self respect has grown up among the people, a health conscience.

"The children as a whole are cleaner, better in physique, better clothed, better fed and better nourished than they have ever been as long as records have been kept.

I believe every thinking parent, every school trustee and every municipal official will agree that all money spent on health education in the schools pays larger dividends in health, in life itself, than any other part of the money invested, important as are all the other departments in the education of our children.

This means that a youngster is going to learn the simple rules about the care of the body, simple facts about digestion, respiration, daily intestinal habit, about the right kinds of food, about the value of sleep and of play, how diphtheria and other ailments may be prevented, the value of bathing and the cleaning of the teeth and much more helpful health knowledge.

And, as mentioned above, because these children grow up with this health knowledge and hand it down to their children, the health standard of the whole community is raised.

HIGHER VALUE FOR YOUNG PIGS

Sir,—In the article in the Guardian of the 24th the writer cannot see any reason for advising farmers keeping their young pigs and finishing the product, when he can realize from \$4.00 to \$5.00 per pair on them at five weeks old, at which time he has had no outlay, either for food or labor.

We know of examples which justify our making this remark. (Example) A litter of 10 pigs of which four were sold at five weeks for \$10, and the other six fed for six months, and marketed through the Maritime Live Stock Association realized \$36.00, now had these six pigs being sold at five weeks old, they would have realized \$15.00 therefore for finishing the product he realized the paltry sum of \$3.50 per pig, which is to remunerate him for the six months feed and the labor entailed.

Had this farmer raised two litters of 10 pigs each and shipped them all to the dealers as suckers, he would have realized \$50.00 and been \$4.00 in pocket, thereby saving all his grain, small potatoes, which sold at 20c per bushel last winter and many hours of labor spent in finishing the product.

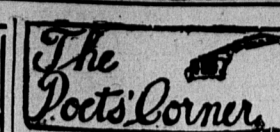
