General Morrison Buried Yesterday

OTTAWA, June 1.—The "last post" was sounded over the grave of one of Canada's greatest soldiers Saturday afternoon when the remains of Major General Sir Edward W. B. Morrison, under whose command the Canadian corps wrought havoc along the German lines during the Great War, were buried in Elchwood Cemetery, while thirteen guns of the first brigade Canadian field artillery, of which Sir Edward was Honorary Colonel, fired a salute in the vicinity of the cemetery.

The funeral procession was one of most impressive ever held in Canada's Capital.

MONTREAL, Que., June 1.—Domestic livestock report. Cattle received 751. There was comparatively little offering of cattle, average quality was only fair and prices were steady to slightly firmer bulk of steers were sold within range of \$6 to \$7.40. Cows were in good demand at \$6 for good cows and \$5.75 for straight car lots of medium good average quality. There were no real good bulls common and medium kinds bought from \$3.50 to \$5. Quotations butcher steers \$7.25 to \$7.75, medium \$6.50 to \$7.25, common \$5.50 to \$6.25, butcher heifers good \$6.75 to \$7.25, medium \$6.00 to \$6.50, common \$4.00 to \$4.75. Butcher cows \$6.00, medium \$4.00 to \$5.50, common to \$2.50, cutters \$2.50 to \$3.00, butcher bulls good, \$5.50, common \$3.50 to \$5.00. Calf receipts 1936. There were a number of better quality calves on sale today and best lots were in demand at from \$7.50 to \$8.25 with an odd one shade better.

Mixed lots of medium and common quality suckers brought from \$6.25 and common paid fed calves \$4.60 to \$5.50 and lots including a few suckers at \$6. Quotations good at \$7.50 to \$8.25, medium \$6.25 to \$7.00, common \$4.60 to \$6.00, sheep receipts 450. There were few top lambs weighing out at 20 cents per pound. Good lambs were quoted around \$18, per C. W. T. and small lambs at \$6 each.

Sheep were more plentiful and realized from \$5.50 to \$6.75, with bulk of sales around \$6. Quotations cows \$6.50 to \$6.75, hog receipts 1215-5-26tuft31.

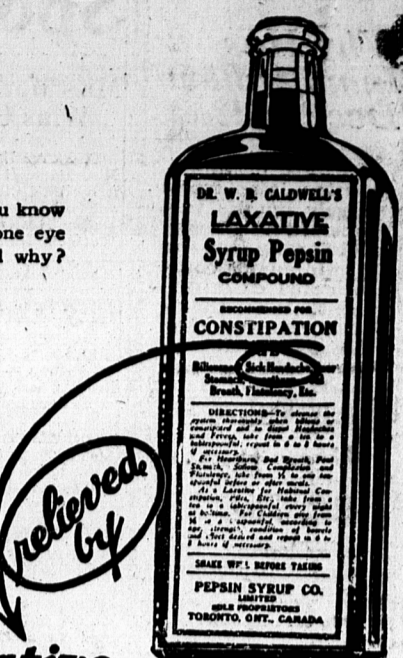
