—**THE MARKETS**

CHICAGO, May 29.—Wheat fell again to-day in Chicago and the market closed 2 1/4c. lower than the previous day. Corn declined 1/4c. while export demand had a good deal to do to hold its own. The absence of wheat with the drop in the price of wheat. Crop reports have been favorable on the whole.

WINNIPEG, May 29.—Wheat was weak again to-day and declined more than 2c. a bushel. The sentiment is general that there will be an abundance of wheat when the season comes round as conditions are very favorable for growth. There was a fair demand for oats which advanced slightly.

TORONTO, May 29.—Wheat prices are on the down grade to-day. The options declined between two and three cents. There is no change in the oat market.

MONTREAL, May 29.—The feature of the week in the market for coarse grains has been the easier feeling in oats, and prices declined 1/4c. per bushel. The demand, however, is good and no big change is looked for in the market. There were no new developments in the hog situation to-day. The market keeps good and higher prices are expected.

EGGS: The receipts of eggs to-day were 2,586 cases as compared with 3,419 for the corresponding date a year ago. The receipts for the week ending May 29th, 1915, were 16,681 cases as against 17,156 for the same week a year ago. A very firm feeling prevails in the market owing to the falling off of supplies. There is also a fair trade doing for local consumption.

DAIRY PRODUCE: The week feeling in the butter situation is the principal feature of the market to-day, and prices have declined from one to 1 1/2c. per lb. At Cowansville 26 1/2c. was bid for butter and refused, while 26 1/2c. was accepted at St. Hyacinthe. A stronger feeling, however, prevails in the cheese situation and prices have again advanced to 18 1/2c. as compared with 18-16c. of last week.

NOT VERY ANXIOUS AT SUBMARINE ACTIVITY

LONDON, June 1.—The success of the German submarines in their attacks on the British fleet supporting the army on the Gallipoli Peninsula, which has resulted in the sinking of the battleships Triumph and Majestic and the ever increasing activity of these boats in the waters around the British Isles, and the threat to carry this underwater warfare to the Suez Canal and the trade which passes through that waterway, while they have not caused any great uneasiness in naval circles here, have brought the officials to a realization of the great danger that will exist if Germany is able largely to increase her fleet of "U" boats.

Trade and from British ports goes on as though there were no submarine danger, and it is stated that there will be no interruption in the operations in the Dardanelles. The fleet there will have to assist the army on the Gallipoli Peninsula taking chances of destruction by submarines and mines or shellfire.

The spirit of British merchantmen was indicated today in the reply of a sailor to Lord Mersey's questions at the inquiry into the sinking of the steamer Falaba by a German submarine sometime ago. Asked whether he would go to sea again, the sailor promptly replied: "Yes."

—talion, has arrived from the front, and is returning to Canada on sick leave. He is a son of Senator Curry of Montreal.

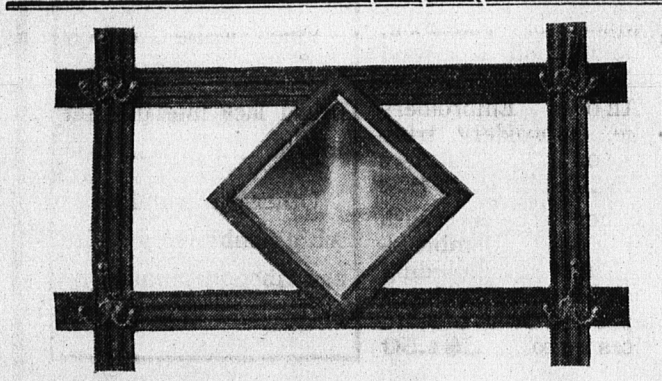
Capt. Gault McCombe, who was wounded in the leg, is now convalescent.
