BIG BUSINESS DEAL.—One of the largest mercantile deals pulled off in this city for some time was closed yesterday by which the large Summerside firm of R. T. Holman Ltd. will take over the entire future business of Messrs Beer & Weeks. This transfer comprises three floors of the large building of Messrs Beer & Weeks, the latter firm continuing the carpet and linen departments on the same floors as previously access to which will be in the usual way by electric elevator. This transaction gives the popular firm of Holman's Ltd. a splendid opportunity for extending the business so successfully carried on by them both in Summerside and Charlottetown. Mr. J. J. Crockett will continue as manager of the enlarged business.

Church Union Bill, now before Parliament:

"The Act to incorporate The United Church of Canada is necessary," says the committee:—

- (1) Because all lawyers agree that incorporation is necessary for ordinary civil uses.
- (2) Because the Basis of Union upon which the churches concerned are uniting expressly provides that the United Church shall be an incorporated body.
- (3) Because the Methodist Church is an incorporated body, the Congregational denomination consists of separate autonomous units, but the Congregational Union of Canada, and all its principal congregations and general institutions are incorporated.
- (4) Because the Presbyterian as well as the other denominations many individual congregations are incorporated: All three of the churches administer their funds and schemes through the medium of incorporated bodies. In order to combine and co-ordinate the various funds and enterprises brought into the United Church by the uniting churches, it is necessary that these be merged into an incorporated body (for civil purposes only).
- (5) Because temporal as well as spiritual interests are involved in the Union. Parliament is asked in the bill to decide the question of Union, nor any other spiritual interest. These have been settled by the churches concerned, and each following its own constitution, spiritual interests within the realm of the church, the uniting bodies now seek from the State a necessary legal instrument to enable the United Church to satisfactorily administer its temporal interests.

WHAT BILL STATES.

- (a) That the three negotiating churches believe that the promotion of Christian unity is in accordance with the Divine will.
- (b) That they recognize the obligation to seek and promote union with other churches, adhering to the same fundamental principles of the Christian faith.
- (c) That they have the right to unite with one another without loss of their identity upon terms which they find to be consistent with such principles.
- (d) That they have adopted a basis of union.
- (e) That they have agreed to unite.
