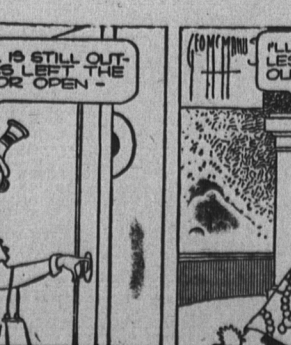
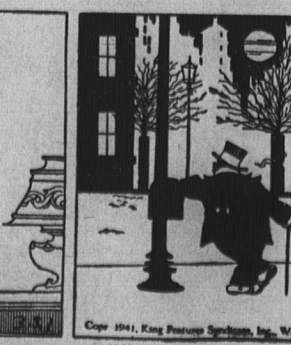

Wants Government To Subsidize Plant In Eastern N. S.

OTTAWA, March 20 - (CP) - Clarence Gillis (C.C.F. Cape Breton South) told the House of Commons today he could "see no reason" why the government should not subsidize a shipbuilding plant in eastern Nova Scotia, or set up a plant of its own, "to be operated as a national project, no one making any profit out of it."

Mr. Gillis said "admittedly something is necessary" in eastern Nova Scotia to rebuild shipbuilding, "the only industry they have." Shipbuilding was much needed at present and the need would grow. If the government took the action he proposed, "it would give that part of the country a new lease of life, it would provide ships during the war; and when the war is over it could be maintained as an industry, for rebuilding is going to be important for a long time to come."
