Canadiens Strengthen Grip On First Place By Defeating Bruins 3-1

MONTREAL, Dec. 19 (CP)—Montreal Canadiens strengthened their hold on top spot in the National Hockey League tonight by defeating Boston Bruins 3-1 in one of the hardest fought games of the Forum this season.

Although beaten, the Bruins were far from out-played and made a battle of it all the way to delight a sell-out crowd of more than 12,000. The Bruins of tonight were a far cry from the Boston team that was whipped 13-4 the last time they played here. They looked more like the team that beat Canadiens in Boston two weeks ago.

Haegg Selected As Athlete Of The Year

NEW YORK, Dec. 19 (AP)—Gunder Haegg, Swedish runner with the world's fastest 100-yard dash, was named as the 1943 athlete of the year.

Haegg, whose eight straight triumphs on United States tracks this summer netted approximately \$150,000 for the army air forces relief society, received 100 points in the Associated Press poll to determine a successor to Frankie Sinkwich, Georgia footballer.

Twenty-seven of the 69 sports writers who cast ballots listed the Swede in first place. Twelve others ranked him second and four listed him third. He was awarded on a basis of three for each first-place vote, two for second and one for third.

ees won him the American League's most valuable award, was a distant second to Haegg with eight first-place votes and an aggregate of 59 points.

In winning, Haegg becomes the first foreigner ever to walk off with the bounty in the 13 year history of the poll. He also is the first track man to be honored since Jesse Owens, the Ohio State bullet, triumphed in 1936 following his four Olympic Games victories.

Haegg, however, does continue the virtual monopoly which the amateur athletes have had over the voting since Joe Louis annexed the laurels in 1935.

Only Joe DiMaggio of the Yankees, whose consecutive hitting streak of 56 games won for him in 1941, has been able to break through from the ranks of the play-for-pay boys since then.

Maple Leafs Chalk Up Double Win Over Hawks

CHICAGO, Dec. 19 (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs tightened their grip on second place in the National Hockey League tonight by defeating the Chicago Black Hawks for the second straight night, 5-2, and ending the Hawks' home winning streak of seven before 15,345 spectators in the Chicago Stadium.

The Leafs, who outscored the Chicagoans 8-4 last night at Toronto, employed a strategy of shooting their first strong line against the Hawks reserves and enjoying the second seconds against the Chicago varsity forwards of Clint Smith, Doug Bentley and Bill Mosenko.
