CARE OF DOMESTIC ANIMALS

(By W. M. Lea)

Domestic animals under natural conditions are rarely troubled with sickness; stable them and they are open to all manner of complaints peculiar to their kind. If we would then avoid trouble, keep them as near as possible during confinement to the conditions of nature. Probably from seventy-five to ninety per cent. of all illness in farm animals is due to digestive derangement of some sort, most of which could be avoided or noticed in the early stages and intelligently treated and easily cured. The trouble is many attendants are not observing men, as Sherlock Holmes puts it, they see but do not observe. Every person having domestic animals in his care should train himself to notice the condition of animals every time he passes them; this will readily become a habit, and the symptoms of any illness will be noticed in the early stages when the chances of success in treatment are very much better than later on. Every stockman or owner of horned cattle should keep from five to ten pounds of epsom salts, and as soon as possible after an animal is noticed to be any "off fed" give a drench of from 1/2 to 2 lbs. If they aren't very sick this won't hurt them, and it will very often prevent an attack of indigestion that may prove serious.

If you suspect indigestion and are not experienced with ordinary treatment of live stock it need not concern you in which of the four stomachs of the animal the trouble may be located; the treatment is practically the same and a good dose of epsom salts will generally move the trouble out; but in cases of bloating and severe pain always give rain oil and spirits of turpentine, blanket and do all we can to warm the stomach up. When the medicine operates recovery is generally rapid if the animal is kept on light feed. This is very important; many animals that have had only a light attack of indigestion or infection of the paunch or first stomach and well on the road to recovery are, through the anxiety of their owner to see them feeding, thrown back into a condition from which they never recover. Over-feeding, violent changes of feed, or feeding damaged food, are common causes of indigestion, and over-eating has brought the trouble on and the stomach is sensitive, only try to get the animal to eat until the digestive organs have had a rest and chance to recover normal condition! But the average man likes to see a sick animal eat. As dangerously sick ones rarely eat, he wishes to see signs of recovery, and in his anxiety he often hinders the chances by giving too much or unsuitable food. Only light rashes very sparingly fed should be given for several days after, depending on the severity of the attack. It doesn't hurt a strong animal to fast a few days, and it is well to err on the safe side. See the manger is cleaned of all feed at this time, as it is really surprising what effect a little feed will have during the period of convalescence. Bring them back to their usual feed gradually and try to learn the cause of the trouble. Change the feed if necessary and give some good stomach stimulant in their feed; or feed one of the many "stock feeds" now on the market. These conditioners are practically of

It will always prove wisest to grow sufficient succulent feed such as roots and corn to provide a properly balanced ration for all animals. Carried over winter, turnips are one of the heaviest yielding and surest crops grown in the province, and a generous ration of this succulent feed will keep stock in a vigorous condition through the winter months.
