THE STEAMERS.—The *Minto* docked in Pictou yesterday afternoon at 4.05 o'clock with 55 tons freight, 50 sacks mail and 30 passengers. The *Earl Grey* which left Charlottetown at 8.30 o'clock arrived in Pictou at 3.05 taking over 60 passengers, 150 tons freight and 75 sacks mail.

THE LOST WAS FOUND.—At 11 a. m. on March 17th Mr. Edward C. McCallum, Brackley Point, let his cattle out to water and as the day was fine they wandered to the fields returning at 4 p. m., without a valuable calf. Search was at once commenced and followed far into the night without any sign of the missing animal. Wednesday, Thursday and Friday with the same result. Saturday the searchers were so discouraged that they did not think it any use to try, but on Sunday, Mr. Neil C. McCallum, "Concrete" and Mr. Gouin McCallum, the "grand old man" of Erackley Point thought they would make one more effort to find the missing calf. Coming hours about 5 feet and then melted its way a small hole among some trees on the Black River Road and looking down about eight feet saw the long looked for calf. WHERE THE RUBE SCORED.—A good story is going the rounds of the city of the manner in which a cure old farmer Bonshaw was given the better of four city men, follows with reputation for close deals. On Sunday last, it appears, the four city men went for a sleigh ride to Bonshaw, but before they got to their destination they overtook misfortune, or misfortune overtook them, whichever way it was, their team broke through the ice, and though they succeeded in getting the horse out, the animal was so affected by its unexpected icy bath, that it died shortly afterwards. The party went in a predicament. How to get back to Charlottetown was the problem before them to be solved. True they had a sleigh, but a dead horse is hardly capable of doing some twelve or fourteen miles with a heavy load. After vainly pondering on way out of the difficulty help came to them in the shape of an old farmer of the locality, who offered to do the needful for them for the paltry remuneration of the dead horse's hide. Glad to get off so lightly, the city men readily consented to this bargain, and they were accordingly driven to the city by the farmer's sleigh. On the following day, the farmer hitched up his team and pulled the carcass of the horse in to Charlottetown, where he promptly disposed of it as fox meat for the sum of \$25. The chagrin of the owner of the horse and of his companions when they learned of the farmer's deal can be better imagined than described. To have been got the better of a deal by a countryman has left a sore spot that will be a long time in healing.

WORTH KNOWING.
Make a lather of good soap, adding a little baking soda or ammonia, when washing eiderdown quilts. When washing rations do not put it through a wringer. After rinsing wring loosely and hand out slightly heavy with water. This way the article will not need much ironing. To keep colored wash goods from fading soak over night in a solution of sugar of lead and water, allowing an ounce of the former to two gallons of the latter.

CHOP UP LEMON.
To get the best flavor and effect from the lemon when making mince-meat, boil the lemon till tender and when cold take away the seeds and chop it up before adding to the other ingredients, says The Kansas City Star. This is an excellent way, for the mince-meat keeps much longer, and no hard case-forms on top, which often appears when the lemon is used in the raw state.

POSSIBILITIES OF RAISINS.
No wonder we talk of plum pudding and plum cakes when we mean raisin pudding and raisin cakes. For raisins that give these sweets their names are as good as plums. Probably Little Jack Hornor himself pulled a raisin from his Christmas pie and not a plum. There are two satisfactory ways of toasting raisins. One is to pour boiling water over the raisins and let them stand in it until they are plump and soft; then the stones can be easily removed. Another way is to keep the hands constantly moistened with very cold water. This keeps the seeds from sticking and makes it easy to handle even dry raisins.

The small stoneless Sultanias, of course, make this seeding or stoning process unnecessary, but these have not the size and flavor of the larger raisins which have seeds in them. Seeded raisins can be bought that are quite satisfactory for most cooking.

Here is a recipe for Sultanias cake. Cream together a half cupful of butter with the same amount of sifted Rub these into eight cupfuls of flour, to which a tablespoonful of baking powder has been added. Then add a cupful of granulated sugar and a cupful of Sultanias raisins, which have been warmed in the oven. Raisins should always be warmed, by the way to keep them from sinking. Then add two eggs, beaten light, and milk enough to make a batter of proper consistency. Bake in a loaf in a moderate oven. This cake keeps fresh for a long time.

EGGLESS COOKIES.
Two cupfuls of granulated sugar and one cupful of lard creamed together. To this add two teaspoonfuls of soda dissolved in one cupful of sour milk. Mix well and add a pinch of salt and nutmeg or any flavoring desired. Next stir and knead in flour to make stiff. Roll out thin and cut in desired shape and bake in a moderate oven. Since eggs are so high, this will be found excellent and cheap.
