## THRILLING STORY OF OCEAN HOP

### German Dornier Arrives In Spain

#### World's Largest Heavier-Than-Air Craft Makes Successful Flight Over "Big Pond".

HORTA, Azores, May 22. (A.P.)—The Giant German flying boat Do-X swept up from the waters of Horta Bay today for Vigo, Spain, on the fourth leg of its homeward flight to Lake Constance, Switzerland.

After only a brief stop for refueling, the 12 motored seaplane took off in fine weather at 6.20 a. m. (3.20 a. m. Eastern Standard Time.) Two hours later it sped over Ponta Delgada, on the Island of Sao Miguel, on its way to Europe.

The huge plane arrived here at 10.55 p. m. last night (7.55 p. m. Eastern Standard Time) from Holywood, Newfoundland. Neither Fraulein Antonia Strassman, woman passenger-purser, nor any others of its crew of 14 landed from the ship as it bobbed in the harbor for less than eight hours.

The plane alighted north of the island of Fayal and taxied around to the harbor off Horta, where the crew immediately began to refuel the largest heavier-than-air craft and clean up for the next flight.

After giving hundreds of persons gathered along the seawall a sight of it, the ship taxied away from the harbor and soon was off. Everyone aboard the ship was in the best of spirits. The engines were running perfectly, the crew said. The weather was clear and bright, with a southerly wind and calm sea, as it took off.

The Captain said the flight over the Atlantic from Newfoundland was made at a height of 600 feet in fine weather until the craft was near the Azores where it met fog and rain.

### English Midlands Inundated

#### Heaviest Floods In Half Century Maroon Thousands In Their Homes.

(Associated Press) Dozens of other towns and villages were wrestling with high water. ### LONE WOMAN FLIER BEATS ATLANTIC IN RECORD CROSSING

#### Amelia Earhart Putnam Lands In Ireland From Harbor Grace, Nfld. In 14 Hours And 54 Minutes — Tells Thrilling Tale Of Battle With Storms All The Way Over—Flew Blind For Five Hours When Altimeter Breaks — Plane Was In Danger Of Catching Fire.

CULMORE, Ulster, North Ireland, May 22.—Amelia Earhart Putnam, the first woman ever to fly the Atlantic alone, landed yesterday afternoon in a field in this green countryside after a hazardous flight in which she conquered fog and storm and the even more dangerous menace of fire.

Four hours after she put out Friday afternoon from Harbor Grace, Newfoundland, she saw flames spitting from her exhaust. But she did not turn back.

"I thought it safer to go ahead," she said.

#### AS FAMOUS AS "LINDY"

Flying on the fifth anniversary of the successful conclusion of Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh's New York-Paris hop, she put her name just under his on the roll of trans Atlantic honors, for Colonel Lindbergh is the only other person in the world who has made a solo trans Atlantic flight.

#### A SURPRISED IRISHMAN

It was 1.45 p.m. (7.45 a.m. Eastern Standard Time) when her almost fuelless ship came to rest in Mr. Gallagher's field. She bounded out of it and ran a few yards to the farmhouse, where she found a very surprised Irishman. Mr. Gallagher offered her tea but she was in too much of a hurry to take it. So he motored her to Londonderry, five miles away, and there she put in a trans Atlantic call.

#### ESTABLISHES NEW RECORD

"I did it!" she exultingly told her husband, George Palmer Putnam, publisher, who was waiting anxiously in New York for news of her.

Mrs. Putnam made approximately 2,000 miles in 14 hours and 54 minutes, giving her the best time record of any of the trans Atlantic fliers.

#### HEADED FOR PARIS

She was headed for Paris when she took off from Harbor Grace, but she encountered too much trouble to make it possible to go any farther—almost too much to get to Ireland.

#### TRYING EXPERIENCE

"About four hours after leaving Newfoundland," she said, "I noticed flames from the exhaust, and became very uneasy. But it would have taken four hours to get back and I thought it safer to go ahead.

### Given Mandate To Form Cabinet

(Associated Press) TOKYO, May 22.—The prospect of a strong national emergency cabinet headed by Admiral Viscount Makoto Saigo, former Governor of Korea, emerged today from the welter of anxiety and bewilderment into which terrorism and the assassination of Premier Suoyoshi Inukai plunged Japan a week ago.

Accepting the advice of Prince Saloni, venerable political oracle, Emperor Hirohito summoned Admiral Saigo to the palace today and handed him a mandate to form a Cabinet capable of guiding the nation through one of the gravest crises in history.

### RETURNING WITH LARGE CAN. ORDERS

#### Scottish Commission Sails From Montreal With Half Million Dollars In Orders.

MONTRÉAL, May 21.—(By the Canadian Press)—Bearing an estimated total of half a million dollars in orders from Canadian business firms the Scottish mission sailed from the port of Montreal today on its return voyage to Glasgow aboard the Anchor-Donaldson liner Letitia. After spending a day in Quebec the vessel arrived here a week ago with 120 business men and nearly 100 exhibits of Scottish industry aboard.

Following several official functions, the exhibits were thrown open to business representatives and the general public. An estimate placed at 60,000 the number who visited the ship. The enthusiasm with which the mission was received by the Canadian public and buyers for mercantile houses brought expressions of gratification from members of the party.

### FAMOUS FLYER AND PASSENGER DIE IN CRASH

ROME, May 22. (A.P.)—Captain George Endres was killed yesterday in a crash of his plane 'Justice for Hungary' in which he and Captain Alexander Maygar flew from Harbor Grace, Newfoundland, to Budapest in 1931.

The ship plunged to earth and burst into flames at Littorio Field, where Italy's leading airmen and some of the most famous in the world had congregated to welcome Captain Endres to the convention of trans-Oceanic fliers which opens tomorrow. Captain Julius Bittay, the second occupant of the plane, also was killed. The ship was coming from Budapest.

Scores of aviators rushed toward the burning plane with fire extinguishers, but by the time the flames had been quenched the ship was a twisted wreck and the bodies of the airmen were unrecognizable.

The motto of the air force, that although some may die others must carry on, was exemplified a few minutes after the crash when eighty one pursuit planes went aloft for a dress rehearsal of the air circus that will be put on next Thursday.

When the bodies of the two fliers had been extricated they were covered with Italian flags and were turned over to the Hungarian Minister who will arrange to send them home.

### North Sydney Girl Suicides

(Canadian Press) NORTH SYDNEY, N. S., May 22.—Mary Ann Bennett, 21, died today in hospital of wounds believed to have been self-inflicted. Yesterday her father heard her fall to the floor, and found her lying prone. She told him she was all right, but in lifting her to her feet he felt a gun under her clothing. Her story was that a strange man had entered the room and shot her. She was immediately taken to hospital where efforts to save her life were unavailing.

### CHANTILLY, France, May 22

—Marcel Boulenger, French writer, died here yesterday. He was 59 years old.
