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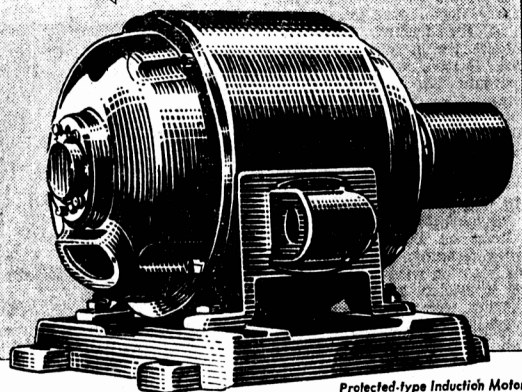

FEAST OF CORPUS CHRISTI CELEBRATED AT TIGNISH

The feast of Corpus Christi was celebrated in Tignish on Sunday May 29th when immediately following the regular Sunday High Mass there took place a procession headed by a cross-bearer and two acolytes followed by the junior children of Mary, dressed in white with white veils and carrying their banner, then the Junior Holy Name boys, also carrying their Holy Name of Jesus Banner, they were followed by the younger children, then the altar boys in white surplices and the choir also wearing surplices, then came four little flower girls in white with flowing white veils, carrying baskets of rose petals which they dropped on the pathway as they walked along for immediately following them came the priest, carrying the Most Blessed Sacrament, walking under a canopy which was borne by four men, then came the women of the congregation, followed by the men. The procession of choir, flower girls and priests with the Blessed Sacrament proceeded down the centre aisle of the church and met at the door by the children who had already taken their ranks under the guidance of their teachers the Rev.
