

NO MORE EXILES TO SIBERIAN PRISONS.

NEW YORK, October 17.— That Russia is to abolish the dread decree of banishment to Siberia by order of the Czar, is the news received from St. Petersburg. The Russian minister of justice it is said, is preparing a bill completely abolishing penal servitude in Siberia and substituting the same punishment in the penitentiary of European Russia. Of late years the number of convicts in Siberia has been increasing and there have been protests from the free people that the country is overrun with the scum of European jails. The authorities recognize that the dumping of convicts in Siberia is seriously hampering the development of that country.

THE NAVAL QUESTION.

OTTAWA, October 17.— There has been much speculation on the subject of the naval policy of the government and with regard to Hon. F. D. Monk's position. While no official statement can be procured, there is warrant for stating that the position of affairs is substantially as follows: It is understood that Mr. Monk is convinced that the situation which confronts the empire at this juncture is grave and even critical. But he is earnest and even insistent in his opinion that no assistance should be given by Canada even as an emergency contribution, without referring the question to the people. There is good reason to believe that the latter view is not shared by the prime minister, who believes that the situation demands immediate and effective aid.

RUSTY STEALS WARDEN'S AUTO.

NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—That kindness does not always work a reformation in a prisoner is the belief of Charles Donohue, who two months ago was chosen warden for the County Jail at New Haven. This conclusion flashed upon him last Thursday when he discovered that the \$3,700 automobile which he purchased ten days before, had been stolen from the prison by Timothy O'Toole, a prisoner.

Since its erection eight years ago the County Jail has become famous for its inability to induce its charges to remain within its gates for the period of their sentence. Only fifteen weeks ago five left hurriedly, taking all articles in the furniture factory, except a few unfinish chairs. When O'Toole arrived at the jail five months ago on a six months' sentence for having stolen an automobile he said he was a resident of the west side of Manhattan and that he was a chauffeur. When Warden Donohue got his automobile O'Toole, by that time a trusty was made the prison chauffeur.

Warden Donohue, who is a Red Sox rooter, journeyed to Boston to witness the game last Thursday. As he stepped from his new automobile at the station he was informed by O'Toole that the engine was working stiff and needed a long run.

All right, said Donohue, tell the deputy warden I want you to take the car for a long spin. O'Toole began the long spin immediately. O'Toole, the New York police say is one of the city's most energetic automobile thieves Detective George Trojan after visiting many garages found the warden's auto in a garage in West Thirty-seventh street near Broadway.

WANTS BANKER TO PAY \$25,000.

NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—Wall street and the glove trade will watch with acute interest the third trial, beginning before Judge Hendricke, of William H. Left's suit for \$25,000 for alleged personal damages against Percival Kuhne, of the banking houses of Vnauth Nachod & Kuhne Alfred Whitman, also a member of the firm and a relative of William Knauth. Mr. Left charges Mr. Kuhne with directing and Mr. Whitman with leading an assault upon Mr. Left in the William street banking house, several clerks participating in the attack, according to the charges Mr. Left has emerged with severe physical injuries.

Mr. Left is a little more than five feet in height and of small frame Mr. Whitman is more than six feet in height and athletic in appearance. He testified to his weight being 186 pounds in one of the two previous trials, both of which resulted in disagreement of the juries. The defendants have denied any assault, declaring that Mr. Left fell in descending the stairs.

WEATHER HARD ON WESTERN CROPS.

OTTAWA, Oct. 16.—A bulletin issued today by the census and statistics office covers the crop conditions in Canada for the month ended September 30. It states that during this month disastrously wet weather continued to prevail over most parts of Canada, especially over the provinces of Quebec, Ontario and Manitoba. In September 30 large areas of grain both east and west were still either uncut or were exposed to the wet in stock. Much damage has been caused by sprouting and in the Northwest provinces second growth has in numerous instances caused uneven ripening and consequent lowering of grade. Frosts during September in these provinces did some damage, but as a rule only late sown crops, including flax, were seriously affected. In parts of Southern Ontario the ground is so wet that many farmers have abandoned the sowing of fall wheat for next year.

For spring wheat the estimated production is 188,816,600 bushels, as compared with 189,904,508 bushels last year. For fall wheat the estimate is 16,868,700 bushels, compared with 26,014,900 bushels last year, the total estimated wheat production being therefore 205,685,300 bushels as compared with 215,915,500 bushels in 1911, a decrease of five per cent. The yield per acre is 21.18 bushels for all wheat as against 20.75 bushels last year.

Oats show a total production of 281,502,106 bushels compared with 354,585,600 bushels last year. The yield per acre being 41.39 bushels compared with 37.75 barley is estimated to yield a total of 48,895,100 bushels compared with 40,631,100 bushels last year.

U. S. CONSUL FORMER CANADIAN, SUICIDES.

TENERIFFE, Canary Islands, Oct. 17.—William Whitney Kitchin, U. S. consul at Laguna, committed suicide last night by shooting himself with a revolver. He was a sufferer from chronic heart disease. He was born in Toronto 1875.

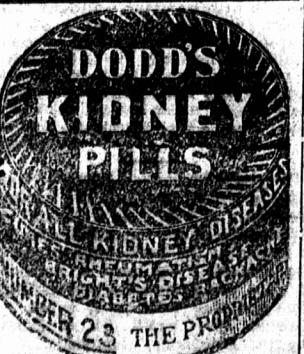
